#### DIOCESAN COUNCIL

## JULY 2018 TO JUNE 2019

Diocesan Council met on 10 occasions over the 2018/2019 period.

During the twelve months July 2018 to June 2019, Diocesan Council, chaired by the Archbishop, The Most Rev'd Geoffrey Smith, considered a number of key strategic positions and policy documents that included matters relating to governance, property development, professional standards, the financial affairs of the Synod, parish management as well as Vision 2022. It should be noted that Work, Health and Safety and Safe Ministry are standing items on the Diocesan Council agenda.

Mr Philip Adams was commissioned as Chancellor for the Diocese of Adelaide at the Synod Eucharist on 19 October 2018.

Mr Simon Murray and Mr Tim Browning both retired from Diocesan Council during the last financial year, having made a considerable contribution to the life of the Diocese.

Sadly, Mr Allan Perryman, a long-standing member of the Diocesan Council died in March 2019. Allan, whose wisdom was much appreciated, made a considerable contribution to the life of our Diocese in so many ways and will be greatly missed.

Elections and Appointments to various Diocesan Committees, entities and Anglican schools is a standing item. Diocesan Council places significant importance to all appointments and is not only grateful that so many people volunteer their time and skills to support the mission of the

Church in so many ways, but also is encouraged by the high calibre of volunteers.

Diocesan Council received presentations from Archbishop and Archdeacon Mintern relating to their UK trip, the Secretary of Synod on Risk Management, Operations Executive on the new Diocesan Council Portal. Presentations were also received from the Church in Society Ministry Unit, Education & Formation Ministry Unit, Professional Standards, the Mission and Property Strategy Task Group. New York, and was ordained deacon and priest in the Diocese of New York, before returning to Adelaide for a curacy at St. David's, Burnside (1966-67). Following his curacy, Bishop George accepted the position of Priest in Charge and Army Chaplain, St Barbara's Church Woomera (1967-69), before moving to Perth as Sub-Warden and Chaplain, St. George's College, University of WA, in the Diocese of Perth. Significant spells of ministry were to follow as Dean of Brisbane (1973-81), and Rector, St. John's Church, Canberra (1981-89), and Archdeacon of Canberra (1982-89).

- Receiving his D.D. in 1989, Dr George was consecrated as a Bishop in the Church of God and ministered as an Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn from 1989-1991. He was then elected and served as Archbishop of Adelaide from 1991-2004, overseeing a period of significant change and challenges.
- Bishop George was a significant supporter of the ordination of women and ordained five women to the priesthood on 5 December 1992 at St Peters Cathedral.
- Among Bishop George's many wider contributions, we note his ongoing involvement and support for defence force chaplaincies, the General Synod International Affairs Commission, ecumenical relations, and perhaps most notably, chairing both the Anglican Communion Migrant and Refugee Network (1998-2008) and General Synod Refugee Task Force (2001-2004). He was recognised in the 2001 Australia Day Honours as an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) "for service to the Anglican Church, ecumenism and to the community through engagement in social

- policy issues and international relief work."
- We note that Bishop Ian resigned as the third Archbishop of Adelaide following criticism of his handling of allegations of child sexual abuse. We also note that when he appeared as a witness at the Royal Commission into Institutional Reponses to Child Sexual Abuse Bishop Ian said that his response had been a serious error of judgement.
- Diocesan Council is aware of the very serious damage, and ongoing pain, child sexual abuse causes to victims as well as their families and is committed to the safety of children and vulnerable people within the life of the church in this Diocese.

## Amanda Harfield

The past twelve months has been a time to lay the foundations for longer term sustainability and to work on our governance processes, in addition to implementing Vision 2022. The development of a three year action plan for Vision 2022 and a forward looking financial forecast are important tools in our decision making. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our Synod employees who are constantly looking for ways to deliver services at a high level in an efficient way. This has been a strong focus for us in 2018/19.

#### Vision 2022

Vision 2022 has now had its first full twelve months of operation supported by an Action Plan endorsed by Diocesan Council (and provided in last year's Synod papers). As with all plans of this type, there is a need to be flexible and to change as circumstances require. Having said that, there were some good achievements against the plan, including:

- implementation of an 'Employee Assistance Program' for clergy and spouses as a first port of call for wellbeing issues;
- completion of the work of the Mission and Property Strategy Task Group;
- commencement of a new Director, Formation and Discernment:
- advanced work on a new 'Adelaide Anglicans' website:
- review of the Playford Cluster ministry;
- continued support for culturally diverse ministry and our chaplaincy program in hospitals and schools.

We look to completing any outstanding actions

and also implementing the three year Action Plan to complete Vision 2022.

#### National Redress Scheme

In February 2019 the Synod became a participating institution of the National Redress Scheme, through the company Anglican Redress (National Redress Scheme) Limited. This now provides another redress avenue for those who have suffered abuse, along side the Diocesan Healing Steps program and a person's right to be heard in our court system.

#### Diocesan Office

The staffing complement in the Office remained steady in the Office in 2018/19, although a function review resulted in a redeployment of staffing hours in the media and communications area. The Ministry and Parish Support function again continued to process a high volume of requests and enquiries from parishes. Property management issues remain a priority area together with supporting parishes under management in accordance with the Parochial Administration Ordinance.

Significant effort has been invested into renewing the Safe Ministry Program, driven by changes in State legislation, the upcoming audit program by General Synod, as well as improvements identified by staff, clergy and parishes. It is hoped the improvements made in our screening processes will not only strengthen our confidence in the safety of our churches, but in the longer terms reduce the investment required by the Synod in the ongoing delivery of the program. The work will continue into 2019/20.

#### Archives

The Archives Office is where much of the documentary, pictorial and narrative evidence

of our flourishing Anglican communities will ultimately be held. In managing that record of our diocesan life, the Archives is a means by which we can collectively remember our stories and know who we are, where we have come from and why we are steering our current course. The Archives Office serves the needs of our parishes, individuals and diocesan entities in preserving, managing, understanding and celebrating our flourishing life together.

The Office also has an important role in equipping the Synod to respond to persons making Healing Steps applications, and a particular focus in the last twelve months has been to equip the Synod to participate in the National Redress Scheme. The Office continues to provide exemplary services with only 0.4 FTE in resources.

## North Road Cemetery

Both North Road and Mitcham Anglican Cemeteries are recognised as a significant part of South Australia's heritage and history. We are continually adding to our extensive collection of genealogical information and from which have been able to contribute to many events & websites.

Over the year there has been increasing telephone, website and walk in enquiries for family history research as well as searching for notable people buried in the cemetery.

We have continued to promote our history and heritage through our various activities and through our successful social media which has been widely recognised by our many followers. Group Cemetery tours along with bus tours have continued, and a number of self-guided tour brochures have also been developed and promoted. These activities are important in promoting the cemetery and also highlighting

expired licences.

2019 marks the centenary of two major aviation achievements, the first flight from England to Australia, and the first mail flight over a significant body of water in the Southern Hemisphere, (Adelaide to Minlaton) by Captain Harry Butler. We have been actively involved in both of these centenary celebrations.

We are also proud to be a part of the Epic Flight Committee under the auspice of the History Trust of SA to commemorate the Smith Brothers flight from England to Australia. Over the course of the year a series of events have been held to mark the various stages of this historic event. The highlight was a service at St Peters Cathedral to commemorate the 97th anniversary of the burial of Sir Ross Smith. The Governor The Honourable Hieu Van Le, Archbishop Geoffrey Smith, Premier Steven Marshall and senior Australian Defence Force representatives were amongst the VIP guests.

This committee has been instrumental in the gaining Federal and State funding to move the Vickers Vimy from its current location at the Adelaide Airport to a new location in the new terminal where it will be displayed prominently for future generations. The relocation is scheduled for 2021.

#### Conclusion

The Synod, as with any organisation, faces some challenges moving forward but the longer term planning that has been undertaken and continuing policy development will enable it to make decisions confidently as it strives for the achievement of Vision 2022.

# PROPERTY, FINANCE AND RESOURCE COMMITTEE (PFRC)

# Ven. David Bassett Chair

The Property, Finance and Resource Committee (PFRC) is a committee of Diocesan Council (DC). This year the meeting schedule has been changed and the Committee now meets bi-monthly reporting back to DC. In this last year the committee met 7 times with one meeting Out of Session.

Membership: Five members from DC: The Archbishop, the Registrar and Secretary of Synod, Archdeacons Lyn McRostie and David Bassett and Kevin Stracey. Sadly the committee notes the passing of Allan Perryman and gives thanks to God for the contribution he made on the committee. Two co-opted experts: Mr Andrew Rosser (Business Manager, St Peter's Girls) and Mr Andrew Phillips (Director, Swanbury Penglase). DC will be asked to nominate a new member for the committee. There is the possibility of one other co-opted expert being brought into the committee.

Continuing to work in line with the charter the Committee has provided guidance and direction to DC on strategic property and finance issues. The Committee provides for detailed analysis of issues and is working with DC and Diocesan Office in the development of its strategic plan.

# MISSION AND EVANGELISM MINISTRY UNIT (MEMU)

The Convenor has resigned and the Mission and Evangelism Ministry Unit has been in recess.

# EDUCATION & FORMATION MINISTRY UNIT (EFMU)

The purpose of the Education and Formation Ministry Unit is to encourage and facilitate the education and formation priorities of the Diocese within the strategic directions set out by the Archbishop and Diocesan Council. Specific points of reference for our work include St Barnabas College, Diocesan Education and Anglican Schools.

EFMU has participated actively in the review of Ministry Units and their role in Vision 2022. In order to achieve Vision 2022 and the necessary leadership and educational outcomes in the Diocese, we affirm the proposed Leadership and Education Ministry Unit.

#### EFMU has continued its focus on

1.Developing educational opportunities for lay members in ministry leadership and administration.

St Barnabas College, represented on EFMU, supports Lay Education learning pathways in conjunction with the broader Diocese.

In 2018-2019 more units were researched and developed for the Bishops' Certificate.

To gain a Bishops' Certificate, participants complete a variety of modules from Bible study to practical ministry skills including Pastoral and Spiritual Care. Across a year, these can be completed in 8 interactive, workshop style seminar days or, if there is demand, a mix of full day and evening sessions. All are welcome, including those who are interested in individual seminars without undertaking the full certificate program.

Seminars hosted by parishes in 2018-2019 enabled lay leaders to participate in Units in-

cluding Leading Small Groups, Getting to Grips with the Gospels and Pastoral and Spiritual Care. More information is available on the St Barnabas College web site.

2. Support our schools in engaging with the wider community as part of the Church's mission.

EFMU welcomed Mark Porter, Anglican Schools Liaison Officer who reports to us on the growth and work of Anglican Schools in the Diocese. The annual Schools' Service in the Cathedral in May and the Student Leadership days provided opportunities for students to meet and celebrate their role in the community. Our attention has also been drawn to what it means to be an Anglican School and any opportunities which may arise for supporting leaders in Anglican Schools.

3. Develop policy and advocacy capacity around public issues.

Throughout 2019, meetings of the Anglican Spiritual Care Network continued. The network is a joint initiative of CiSMU and EFMU, formed to explore responses, challenges and opportunities around the provision of care in parishes and residential facilities.

This work on Spiritual Care in Aged Care has raised awareness of the increasing need for appropriate training for all involved in the care of vulnerable people, including children and those living with a disability. Discussions with Anglicare have led to the formation of a working party of stakeholders to develop a "Parish Listeners Program" to build pastoral capacity in residential aged care facilities.

#### Vision and Purpose

Our Vision is that Anglican parishes, schools, agencies and ministries across the Diocese of Adelaide will actively engage in the wider community, by meeting human need through loving service and by seeking to transform unjust structures of society.

Our Purpose is to facilitate the visible presence, witness and mission of the church in the wider community, by enhancing networks, social advocacy, the development of relationships and partnerships across the Anglican community and engagement with social policy as an expression of the strategic directions set by Diocesan Council and Synod.

#### Meetings

CISMU met on five occasions during the past year in September and November 2018 and March, May and July 2019.

A CISMU power point report was presented by Reverend Dr Joan Riley at the 2018 Synod, and a further report presented by Peter Burke at the November meeting of Diocesan Council at Holy Cross Elizabeth.

The Family and Domestic Violence Working Group was formed in March 2019 with Reverend Dr Joan Riley leading. This followed the Diocese of Adelaide sponsoring Joan to attend the National Family Violence Conference in Sydney hosted by the General Synod Office in response to the General Synod Standing Committee decision to encourage action on Family Violence. The local Working group has considered ways to promote awareness in the Anglican Church in Adelaide on the nature and prevalence of family and domestic violence and is beginning to develop resources and training opportunities for clergy and lay people in consultation with expert organisations and the Archbishop.

Members of the Working Group include: Andrea McDougall, Sarah Breed, Michael Hawke (AnglicareSA), Fiona Harris, Steven Ogden and Joan Riley (Convenor).

During the year there has been an exchange of letters between CISMU and Diocesan Council in relation to the LGBTIQ Apology passed by the Synod of 2017. The apology states:

We apologise to, and seek forgiveness from, people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex or queer, whom we have hurt by words or behaviour which have not displayed the love of God. We are deeply sorry for any

harm we have done, and repent of such ungodly behaviour.

CISMU believes that it is appropriate to further promote this apology to shine a light on the need for a different approach in the way we connect with people in LGBTIQ communities, including those in our own church. CISMU hopes that the publication of the apology may help to create an atmosphere where people in our Diocese are more willing to recognise the significance of this matter for the future of our mission together, and to seek to have good and constructive conversations on the issues raised by the apology

#### Networks

The following CiSMU networks have continued to be active during the past year:

- Anglicans Towards Reconciliation Network This is a growing network which has met on five occasions in the past year at Good Shepherd Plympton. The network continues to bring together Anglicans interested in enhancing their awareness of our shared history and engagement with Aboriginal people through reading, workshops and cultural events. There has been an emphasis in the past year or building stronger linkages between the network as a movement across the Diocese with the RAP Working Group in its specific task in develop a Reflect RAP to further guide our awareness and engagement. Several members of the network are involved in both. Convenors: Jeff Oake and Jill Rivers
- Anglican Ecumenical Network
   This network meets for 'Ecumenical Conversations' five times a year at St Oswald's
   Parkside. In the past year there has been a

continued focus on the ecumenical dimensions of the Constitution of the Anglican Church of Australia and an emerging focus on our relationship with the Uniting Church. Convenors: John Littleton and Peter Burke

- Anglican Refugee Network (30)
  While this network has not been active this past year in terms of meetings, the network still exists and focuses mainly on the provision of Refugee Homemaker Kits for AnglicareSA Refugee Services. There is a need to 'reimagine' this network in the coming year, and a thought has been to draw together people and parishes engaged in various forms of multicultural ministry. Convenor: Jill Rivers
- Anglican Spiritual Care Network (a joint network of CISMU and EFMU) This network brings together people interested in developing the pastoral and spiritual care capacity of people in parishes through opportunities for learning and engagement. During the year there has been a focus on how we might engage more effectively in areas such as aged care and disability. Learning sessions have been developed and provided locally and further opportunities for learning through external organizations have been identified. Some opportunities for parish people to volunteer through AnglicareSA have come to light and these are currently being developed. Convenors: Ann Nadge and Peter Burke
- Anglican Creation Care Network
   The network has visited various parish sites during the year to see how Creation Care is expressed at the local Parish level through Community Gardens, Recycling Projects and

- Water Harvesting. The network is currently supporting the forthcoming Creation Care Seminar to be held at St Peter's Cathedral on Saturday 21 September. *Convenors: Beth Walton and Peter Burke*
- Anglican Opportunity Shop Network
   The network meets twice yearly with meetings this past year held at St Mary's South Road in August 2018 and St Bede's Semaphore in May 2019. Convenor: Brenda Beer and Jill Rivers

#### Parish Community Engagement Fund

CISMU receives submissions for the Parish Community Engagement Fund (resourced by AnglicareSA) and makes recommendations for approval by the CEO of AnglicareSA. During the year the following grants were awarded:

#### **Future Ministry Units**

CISMU has actively participated in the process to refresh the Ministry Units in response to Vision 2022, providing feedback as requested during the year. It is natural that a refreshed Vision will lead to refreshed structures and it is hoped that the Ministry Units to commence

in 2020 will provide opportunities for a new conversation and the further development of existing and new networks to bring key leaders together in various areas of ministry. To borrow some of the language of Vision 2022 is hoped that we will grow and deepen our capacity as a community of disciples intent on sharing God's generosity and blessing in the wider community.

CISMU will have its final meetings in September and November 2019.

# PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS COMMITTEE

The Professional Standards Committee meets monthly, or more frequently as required. The Dioceses of Adelaide, The Murray and Willochra continue to employ a provincial approach to Professional Standards, sharing the same Professional Standards Director, Committee and Panel for the Board. The Committee's practice has been to hold separate meetings for each Diocese with one following on from the other and each meeting being minuted separately. During the 2018/2019 year no complaints were referred by the Professional Standards Committee to the Professional Standards Board.

Members of the Committee in the 2018/2019 year were Mrs Annette Cinnamond (Chair), Ms Carolyn Grantskalns, Ms Jan Nicholson, Mr Peter Caporaso, Rev'd David Patterson (Diocese of The Murray) and Mr Michael Ford (Diocese of Willochra). In August 2018, Ms Carren Walker, was appointed to the Committee.

Ms Sue Wright is the administrative assistant to the Director of Professional Standards based in the Professional Standards Office on a 0.2 FTE basis. The Director of Professional Standards, Ms Theodora Ekonomopoulos resigned from the position in February 2019. The Professional Standards Committee wishes to thank Ms Ekonomopoulos for her dedication and hard work during her period as Director for the Dioceses. Ms Claire Sargent, the Director for the Dioceses of Wangaratta and Ballarat, was appointed as the Interim Director to assist the Dioceses until a permanent replacement can be appointed.

As reported in its 2018 Report to Synod, the Committee identified a need, and put forward recommendations, for professional development training for clergy in the areas of conflict resolution and grievance process facilitation, to enable effective resolution of these matters at the local level. At this point in time the Committee is not aware if any action has been taken in relation to this recommendation.

Following the conclusion of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse the Commission published 10 Child Safe Standards and recommendations specific to the Anglican Church and religious institutions in general. The Safe Ministry Commission has assisted the national Church in developing responses to give force to these recommendations in addition to the Safe Ministry to Children Canon 2017. The Dioceses of South Australia have adopted these measures including the updates to Faithfulness in Service which specifically relate to the safety of children.

The Safe Ministry Commission has continued to address the recommendations of the Royal Commission. Specific examples include the new processes for screening of persons in ministry, particularly for those who engage in ministry to children, including 'occasional' ministry and Persons of Concern. This policy governs the

potential reintroduction of Persons of Concern into parish and worshipping communities. New areas of concern have also been addressed in the documentation, for example issues of cyber safety and image-based abuse.

The emphases of the Office of Professional Standards and the Safe Ministry Commission have been to increase the accountability for decisions with respect to the safety of children and other vulnerable persons.

The year has also seen the introduction of the National Redress Scheme which provides opportunity for victims of abuse born from their association with the Church to seek financial redress without going through a lawyer. The Adelaide Diocese has had a number of applications come through this

pathway. Applications for redress are managed for the Diocese directly by the Registrar.

The network of Directors of Professional Standards from all Anglican Dioceses in Australia meets face-to-face each quarter each time for two days. The Network serves a number of functions including facilitating communication and collaboration between Directors and providing an opportunity for debriefing in a collegial setting. The Network also meets with members of the Safe Ministry Commission at these meetings. This provides further opportunity for a national approach to Professional Standards.

The Diocesan Risk and Audit Committee is a committee of the Diocesan Council constituted pursuant to section 7 of the Diocesan Council and Ministry Units Ordinance 2007. The Committee met on two occasions in 2018/2019.

The Committee's responsibilities include assisting the Diocesan Council to monitor the effectiveness of risk management measures and internal controls within the Synod's operations, to review and report on the effectiveness and independence of the Synod's external auditor, to review the Synod's annual statutory financial statements and the external auditor's audit report and to report to the Diocesan Council on these matters.

The Committee's key activities in 2018/2019 included the following:

- Meeting with management and with the external auditors to consider the Synod's 2017/2018 Financial Statements;
- Reviewing the external auditor's audit report to the Diocesan Council for the year ended 30 June 2018;
- Recommending the 2017/2018 Financial Statements to Diocesan Council for signing;
- Making recommendations to the Diocesan Council concerning the identification and management of risks for all aspects of the Synod's operations;
- Making recommendations to the Diocesan Council around sound risk management

practices and procedures; and

• Reviewing a draft Whistleblowers Policy.

#### THE GUARDIAN

Over the past twelve months, Guardian has continued to chronicle life in the Anglican Diocese of Adelaide. Guardian has delivered stories about the people and places that represent the diversity and strength of the Adelaide Anglican community, while helping to support and enable the churches of the Diocese to grow in evangelism, discipleship, service and generosity.

In aiming to increase the environmental sustainability of the publication, Guardian has sought to decrease its print and post numbers throughout the past year, while directing readers to the digital version available online at Issuu.com. There has been an encouraging uptake from the readership to shift from print to digital, especially amongst the Anglican school community. While this has led to an almost 30% reduction of the print run, it also represents a significant step forward in ensuring the publication's long-term production viability.

The Australasian Religious Press Association, of which Guardian is a Category A member, recognised the publication by awarding them a Bronze certificate for photography at their 2019 Awards ceremony held in Christchurch, New Zealand in September.

Guardian would like to thank all of those who generously contributed their time, ideas and talents over the past twelve months to help ensure the successful production of the publication.



#### ANGLICAN FUNDS SOUTH AUSTRALIA

#### Introduction

Anglican Funds South Australia (AFSA) has had a pleasing year and continues to take steps forward in many areas of its operations and offerings to members.

Funds under Management grew to \$113m and Funds under Administration grew to \$182m during the 2018/19 Financial Year, and AFSA was able to provide the following benefits over the period:

- Interest paid on Community Fund investments \$787,000.
- Saved the community \$84,000 in loan interest expenses.
- Made combined distributions of \$4.14m.
- Generated a total return of 5.92% on the Endowment Fund.

These financial returns directly support the mission, educational, and charitable works of the South Australian Anglican Community.

#### The Community Fund

Thanks to the continuing support of the South Australian Anglican Community the community fund investor base grew to \$36m.

We are proud to help many parishes and Anglican organisations with their day-to-day financial operations, their investments, and with loan funding for many worthy projects.

The Community Fund declared a Participant Distribution for 2018/19 of \$50,000, which is funded through an allocation from its operating surpluses. We are very excited to see this unique initiative continue and look forward to seeing the rewards gained from putting this money to good use in our community.

The Community Fund continues to support a number of other dioceses by carrying out back office functions for their Community Funds. We are in discussions with one of these dioceses regarding the potential for expanding the service we provide.

#### The Endowment Fund

The 2018/2019 Financial Year has once again provided investors with solid returns, but it wasn't all smooth sailing. The first six months to December 2018 markets were very nervous on fears of a global slowdown. These fears were founded on the negative implications of a US-China trade war, a slowing Chinese economy, interest rate rises in the US, an end to quantitative easing in the Eurozone, falling property prices and government instability in Australia.

The last six months to June 2019 saw a complete turn-around ignoring to an extent the US dispute over trade and escalating tensions in the Middle East over oil shipments. The US Federal Reserve ceased raising interest rates with murmurs of possible rate cuts, the Bank of Japan and European Central Bank also hinted at cut-

ting interest rates, and China injected stimulus into their economy through tax reductions and increased subsidies. In Australia, the Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) changed its view on the direction interest rates should move, favouring lower rates and to finish off the year, the Morrison government was re-elected.

The AFSA Endowment Fund's total return for the year slightly underperformed its target of CPI + 5% achieving 5.9% against a target of 6.0%pa. Income distribution of 5.2% remained slightly above target of 5.0%pa.

More importantly, over the Fund's 10-year investment horizon, the Endowment Fund has made a total return of 8.8%pa, which exceeds our target of CPI + 5%pa. During this period the Fund has also fulfilled its primary objective of paying income semi-annually, equivalent to a yield of 5.8%pa against the target of 5.0%pa.

Investments in the Endowment Fund ended the year at \$77m.

Over the past 12 months the AFSA Board and Investment Committee have been disappointed with aspects of the Fund's performance and consequently undertaken a review of our Asset Consultant. Following the review, the AFSA Board and Investment Committee spent 9 months undertaking an extensive Australia wide search for a new Asset Consultant to design and implement a revised Investment strategy. Ten local and interstate firms were reviewed, before interviewing a short list of four asset consultants/advisers.

The search concluded with the AFSA Board agreeing in July 2019 to appoint Russell In-

vestments as the new Asset Consultant. Russell Investments is one of the top 5 global asset consulting firms and offers advice to clients on over \$3.3tr of investments. We believe Russell Investments has strong governance, a robust organisation and has delivered strong investment outcomes to their clients. Russell Investments also has strong "back-office" systems which can support AFSA from an administrative perspective. The appointment of Russell Investments will position the fund to deliver improved performance into the future.

#### **AFSA Board and Committee Changes**

Membership of the Board and Committees has remained unchanged through the year, with the exception of the passing of Allan Perryman, who had been continuously involved with Anglican Funds right from its inception, as Chair of the Board for many years and continuing to serve on the Investment Committee to the end. We give thanks for Allan's life and service to AFSA and in many other committees in this Diocese and nationally. We miss Allan's gentle wisdom but are comforted by the strength of his faith.

#### Our Staff

The work of the Board and management has been greatly assisted during this year by the staff who have worked very hard to make sure that Anglican Funds South Australia continues to be a success. We benefit especially from the stability and experience of our team, with no staff changes during the year. It is only through their dedication and hard work we are able to continue making a significant contribution to the mission and charitable endeavours of the South Australian Anglican Community.



#### ST BARNABAS COLLEGE

# Don Owers Principal

Over the past year St Barnabas College (SBC) has continued to provide high quality theological and ministry education in support of the ministry training needs of the Diocese and the Province.

By the close of the 2018 academic year the College had enrolled 44 students in accredited academic programs with an effective fulltime student load (EFTSL) of 16.75. This year enrolments are slightly lower at 41 students and 15.75 EFTSL. This is an acceptable annual variation (2018 was up 0.9 EFTSL on 2017). In addition, during 2019, 25 people have audited a Bachelor of Theology subject as part of the new 'Personal Enrichment Places' scheme.

At its Commencement Service in February 2019, the College recognised eight of its students as graduates of Charles Sturt University (our teaching partner) including six Bachelor of Theology graduates (two with Distinction, one with Honours), one graduate from the Doctor of Ministry program and one from the Doctor of Philosophy program. Six students were admitted to the diaconate or ordained to the priesthood.

In my report to the 2018 Synod, I mentioned two major challenges SBC needs to overcome if it is to be effective in supporting Vision 2022 and the faith development needs of the Province.

The first of these challenges was (and remains) the financial viability of the College. The College is very conscious of the financial stress being experienced by many parishes, the Diocese as a whole and the Province, and is strongly committed to doing whatever it can to reduce its dependence on Synod grants.

The second major challenge I mentioned was the need to develop a suite of theology and ministry courses that could provide sufficient variety to meet the faith development needs of people with widely differing levels of theological literacy. Furthermore, these courses would need to be offered in such a way as to make them affordable and accessible to people across the Diocese and the Province.

There are no quick and easy solutions to challenges such as these, and short-term expediency inevitably leads to other problems or to failure. With this in mind, through the latter part of 2018, the College developed a long-term strategic plan which, among other things, envisages that:

a. Within ten years SBC will meet all of its recurrent funding needs without Diocesan support. This may seem a long way into the future but realistically it's the time necessary to move the College to new funding models and develop the other financial resources required to achieve self-sufficiency. The fact that long timelines are involved does not mean, however, that there is no need for urgency. Long term goal achievement will depend on immediate, focussed strategic action which is then sustained into the future. Thus, to move toward this goal the College has:

- Initiated discussions around its partnership with St Mark's College, Canberra (which is SBC's conduit to affiliation with Charles Sturt University). These discussions should be finalised by the end of this year with a view to implementing a new and more viable partnership model from Semester 1 2021.
- Undertaken significant work to increase student numbers through the development of additional courses, exploration of possible new student cohorts, improved community engagement, and more focussed marketing.
- Implemented a small task group to pilot the development of a foundation that will generate long term financial support for the College.
- b. By the close of 2021 SBC will have adapted existing courses or developed new courses that will meet the theological and ministry training needs of the Diocese and Province, build parish capacities and encourage engagement in theological study. To meet this challenge the College has:
  - Packaged the Charles Sturt University
    Graduate Certificate in Ministry to
    provide concentrations in Ministry
    Supervision and Church Leadership and
    worked with the Archbishop to create
    half-scholarships to encourage clergy

participation in these courses.

- Created a number of incentives to encourage lay and clergy participation in the Graduate Certificate in Theology and the Graduate Certificate in Ministry (respectively).
- Begun offering Personal Enrichment
  Places (PEPs) which allow lay people and
  clergy to audit selected subjects in the
  Bachelor of Theology program at very
  affordable prices.
- Initiated a review of its online teaching capacity with a view to providing accessible, affordable and reliable delivery of theological and ministry training to those who can't access the College in person

   especially people in rural or remote ministry locations.

Members of Synod will be aware that my time as the Principal of SBC concludes in December this year, by which time I will have been either Acting Principal or Principal for almost exactly two years.

I have worked or studied in six higher education institutions including faith-based and secular institutions, universities and non-university colleges and one overseas university. I am pleased to be able to inform the Synod that at SBC I have experienced a quality of teaching and student engagement that is second to none.

It has been a particular joy to witness and experience the enriching impact, for both students and staff, of SBC's culture of 'Generous Orthodoxy.' As much, if not more than any other single factor, this gracious and positive culture positions the College to continue to provide, faithfully

and effectively, for the development of Godly and theologically-rounded leadership for parishes, schools and agencies throughout the Diocese and the Province.

# DISCERNMENT & MINISTRY FORMATION

Director of Discernment &

Ministry Formation

I began this new 0.5 FTE role in March 2019 and express my gratefulness to the Archbishop for the opportunity to serve the Diocese in this way. The post is newly located within St Barnabas College, reporting to both the Archbishop and the College Principal.

We pay tribute to the extensive work done by Archdeacon Bob George as Director of Formation, and Mrs Rigmor George; their collaboration with a wealth of ministry and philosophy of education experience has led to a sound curriculum being developed and followed in the past few years.

Archdeacon George continues as a valued assistant team member, and I am delighted with the recent announcement that Bishop Denise Ferguson will offer additional oversight especially since her Masters studies were in the field of ministerial formation.

There remains Provincial cooperation with Willochra Diocese, in holding annual Ordination Advisory Conferences and in having several persons in ministerial formation come to Adelaide for occasional seminars on pastoral practice. This encourages newly ordained clergy who are often in remote pastoral districts with

few clerical colleagues to call upon or to mentor them closely. With the recent consecration of a new bishop for The Murray Diocese, we look forward to closer cooperation there too.

The curriculum includes:

#### Inquiry

People enquiring about possible vocational ministry are seen one-to-one. It is envisaged that occasional Enquirers events may be held in future, prior to people joining the Discernment Group.

#### Discernment

Persons who are exploring a vocational calling, who are supported in pursuing this by their pastoral leaders (clergy, chaplains or other relevant persons), and who have completed a minimal number of B.Th. study requirements as stipulated by the Archbishop, are invited to attend a series of 5 or 6 day-long seminars during a calendar year to further explore issues of ministry. Whilst doing so they undergo experiential theological and practical learning experiences, with oversight and encouragement in parishes or other relevant settings.

#### Ordination

Advisory Conference. Held annually, with an occasional additional one under exceptional circumstances, these are at the invitation of the Archbishop with an experienced panel of lay and ordained persons, with detailed submissions by candidates under rigorous but supportive and confidential circumstances. The OAC advises the Archbishop of their recommendations on ordination.

#### Formation

This ideally takes place over a number of years in various stages. Without overcomplicating this report with detail, it takes into account the various levels of experience of people preparing for Ordination as Deacons and Priests and/or recently ordained. The focus is on personal spiritual development, pastoral experience, mentoring and the newly-highlighted area of professional supervision.

#### The curriculum is flexible

For instance, in a couple of recent situations, people in preparation for Ordination who have had extensive ministerial experience in other fields are being provided with alternative reading, study and practical experiences. For all people involved in the various stages, we ask: "What gaps may there be and in what ways can we assist you in being ready in personal character and professional competence once you are ordained?"

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

#### NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements are for The Synod of the Diocese of Adelaide of the Anglican Church of Australia Incorporated (the Association) and include Special Funds and Anglican Funds SA.

#### Basis of Preparation

The Synod of the Diocese of Adelaide of the Anglican Church of Australia Incorporated applies Australian Accounting Standards -Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010-2: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements and other applicable Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet effective, including AASB 16 Leases, are not expected to have a material impact on the future results of the Association.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Associations Incorporations Act South Australia and the constitution of the Synod of the Diocese of Adelaide of the Anglican Church of Australia Inc. The Association is a not for profit entity for reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow statement, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs, modified where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements are rounded to the nearest dollar.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Association in the preparation of the financial statements. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

#### (a) Changes in accounting policies and disclosures

The following accountant standards became effective for the first time during the period:

#### AASB15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers

A new revenue standard applies to every industry across every business for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018. For the Association the new standard will apply for the year ended 30 June 2019.

The core principle of AASB15 is that an entity recognises revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which an entity expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. An entity recognises revenue in accordance with the core principle by applying the following steps:

- 1: Identify the contract(s) with a customer;
- 2: Identify the performance obligations in the contract;
- 3: Determine the transaction price;
- 4: Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations in the contract;
- 5: Recognise revenue when (or as) the entity satisfies a performance obligation.

#### AASB9 Financial Instruments

A new financial instrument standard applies to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018. For the Association the new standard will apply for the year ended 30 June 2019.

AASB9 specifies how an entity should classify and measure financial assets, financial liabilities, and some contracts to buy or sell non-financial items.

Remaining accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year.

#### (b) Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

#### (c) Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year have been measured at their nominal amounts. Employee entitlements payable later than one year have been measured at their nominal amounts and are not expected to be materially different to the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those entitlements

#### (d) Revenue from Contracts with Customers

Fees for Service revenue from contracts with customers is recognised when control of the goods or services is transferred to the customer at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the association expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

#### NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### (e) Other Income

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets

Grants are recognised where the is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with. When the grant relates to an expense item it is recognised as income on a systematic basis over the periods that the related costs, for which it is intended to compensate, are expensed. When the grant relates to an asset, it is realised as income in equal amounts over the expected useful life of the related asset.

When the Association receives grants of non-monetary assets, the asset and the grant are recorded at nominal amounts and released to profit or loss over the expected useful life of the asset, based on the pattern of consumption of the benefits of the underlying asset by equal annual instalments.

Dividend income is recognised as investment income in the statement of profit or loss when the right to receive has been established, except from when the Association benefits from such proceeds as a recovery of part of the cost of the financial asset, in which case, such gains are recorded in other comprehensive income (OCI).

Donations and Bequests are recorded as income when received.

All revenue is stated net of GST.

#### (f) Investments

Investments are purchased primarily as long term investments and not for trading purposes. Listed investments are classified as Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income and carried at market value at the end of the year. Any revaluations to market value are reflected in the Investment Revaluation Reserve. Unlisted debentures and investments in unit trusts are recorded at amortised cost. Investment income is brought to account on an accruals basis, when the right to receive payment is established.

#### (g) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is brought to account at cost or valuation, less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Land and buildings are initially valued at cost. The valuations are subsequently reviewed each year based on the capital values determined by the State Valuer-General. Independent valuations are obtained whenever their carrying amounts are considered likely to differ materially from their valued amounts.

Certain properties belonging to the Anglican Parishes under the Adelaide Diocese are held in the name of the Association for legal reasons. These properties can not be disposed of by the Association unilaterally and since the Parishes are the beneficial owners of the properties, they have not been brought to account as assets belonging to the Association.

#### Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets (excluding land and buildings) is depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives, commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of asset:	Depreciation rate
Plant and equipment	12 - 20%
Office equipment	20%
Computer equipment	33%
Motor Vehicles	12 - 33%
Property Improvements	20%

Asset residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted if appropriate at each balance date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable value.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the income statement. When revalued assets are sold amounts included in the revaluation relating to that asset are transferred to accumulated surpluses.

#### (h) Leases

Lease payments under operating leases, where substantially all of the risks and benefits of ownership of the asset remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

#### NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### (i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense.

#### (i) Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the Cash Flow Statement, cash includes cash on hand, at banks and on deposit that are readily converted into cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

#### (k) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Association reviews the canying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, is compared to the asset's canying value. Any excess of the asset's canying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

#### (I) Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparable figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

#### (m) Financial Instruments

#### (i) Financial Assets

#### Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are classified, at initial recognition, as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income (OCI), and fair value through profit or loss.

The classification of financial assets at initial recognition depends on the financial asset's contractual cash flow characteristics and the Association's business model for managing them.

In order for a financial asset to be classified and measured at amortised cost or fair value through OCI, it needs to give rise to cash flows that are 'solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI)' on the principal amount outstanding. This assessment is referred to as the SPPI test and is performed at an instrument level. The Association's business model for managing financial assets refers to how it manages its financial assets in order to generate cash flows. The business model determines whether cash flows will result from collecting contractual cash flows, selling the financial assets, or both.

#### Subsequent measurement

For purposes of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified in four categories:

- Financial assets at amortised cost (debt instruments)
- · Financial assets at fair value through OCI with recycling of cumulative gains and losses (debt instruments)
- Financial assets designated at fair value through OCI with no recycling of cumulative gains and losses upon derecognition (equity instruments)
- Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

#### Financial assets at amortised cost (debt instruments)

The Association measures financial assets at amortised cost if both of the following conditions are met:

- The financial asset is held within a business model with the objective to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual
  cash flows; and
- The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Financial assets at amortised cost are subsequently measured using the effective interest (EIR) method and are subject to impairment. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised, modified or impaired.

The Association's financial assets at amortised cost includes trade receivables, loan assets, unlisted debentures and investments in unit trusts

#### Financial assets at fair value through OCI (debt instruments)

The Association measures debt instruments at fair value through OCI if both of the following conditions are met:

- The financial asset is held within a business model with the objective of both holding to collect contractual cash flows and selling; and
- The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal
  and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

For debt instruments at fair value through OCI, interest income, foreign exchange revaluation and impairment losses or reversals are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and computed in the same manner as for financial assets measured at amortised cost. The remaining fair value changes are recognised in OCI. Upon derecognition, the cumulative fair value change recognised in OCI is recycled to profit or loss.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

#### NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### (m) Financial Instruments (continued)

#### Financial assets designated at fair value through OCI (equity instruments)

Upon initial recognition, the Association can elect to classify irrevocably its equity investments as equity instruments designated at fair value through OCI when they meet the definition of equity under IAS 32 Financial Instruments: Presentation and are not held for trading

The classification is determined on an instrument-by-instrument basis. Gains and losses on these financial assets are never recycled to profit or loss. Dividends are recognised as other income in the statement of profit or loss when the right of payment has been established, except when the benefits from such proceeds as a recovery of the part of the cost of the financial asset, in which case, such gains are recorded in OCI. Equity instruments designated at fair value through OCI are not subject to impairment assessment.

The Association elected to classify irrevocably its non-listed equity investments under this category.

#### Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss include financial assets held for trading, financial assets designated upon initial recognition at fair value through profit or loss, or financial assets mandatorily required to be measured at fair value through profit or loss, or financial assets mandatorily required to be measured at fair value.

Financial assets are classified as held for trading if they are acquired for the purpose of selling or repurchasing in the near term. Derivatives, including separated embedded derivatives, are also classified as held for trading unless they are designated as effective hedging instruments. Financial assets with cash flows that are not solely payments of principal and interest are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss, irrespective of the business model. Notwithstanding the criteria for debt instruments to be classified at amortised cost or at fair value through OCI, as described above, debt instruments may be designated at fair value through profit or loss on initial recognition if doing so eliminates, or significantly reduces, an accounting mismatch.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are carried in the statement of financial position at fair value with net changes in fair value recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

#### (ii) Financial Liabilities

#### Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, payables, or as derivatives designated as hedging instruments in an effective hedge, as appropriate. All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The Association's financial liabilities include trade and other payables and borrowings.

#### Borrowings

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the EIR method. Cains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised as well as through the EIR amortisation process.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included as finance costs in the statement of profit or loss. This category generally applies to interest bearing loans and borrowings.

#### (n) Critical Accounting Estimates & Judgements

The council members evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current financial information.

Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data obtained both externally and from within the Association.

The Association settled no claims against it for critical incidents in the twelve months ended 30 June 2019 (2018: \$597,000).

The Association may have potential liabilities for claims arising from critical incidents. The Association cannot reasonably estimate the amount of the potential liability and it is uncertain whether any part of these claims or future potential claims will be covered by insurance. A provision of \$460,000 has been recognised in the financial statements in relation to claims in negotiation but not settled as at 30 June 2019.

#### (c) Commitments

The Association has no commitments in respect of contracts for property repair at 30 June 2019 (2018 \$200,461).

#### (d) Perpetual Care - Cemeteries

There is a general expectation that the cemeteries will be maintained in perpetuity. While there may be ongoing cash outflows for future maintenance, the Synod is unable to calculate a sufficiently reliable estimate of any present obligation which may arise under the accounting standards and accordingly has not recognised a liability for this obligation in the financial statements.

# PARISH & MINISTRY REPORTS

#### ADELAIDE DEANERY

Rev'd Canon Jenny Wilson Adelaide Area Dean

It was my great privilege to be appointed Area Dean of the Adelaide Deanery at the Synod Eucharist in October 2018. Heartfelt thanks go to our outgoing Area Dean, The Rev'd Keith Bryce, for his support and encouragement of our deanery over a number of years.

Clergy from the Adelaide Deanery meet on the third Wednesday of each month in different parishes to share lunch, offer one another support, hear about the goings on in the parish we are visiting and ponder the gospel for the following Sunday together.

Just prior to Lent this year, The Rev'd Grant Bullen led us in a quiet day of reflection at St Theodore's, Toorak Gardens, exploring the themes of death and resurrection. The fifteen clergy who attended greatly appreciated a time of reflection in preparation for our nurture of our parishes in Lent. The Rev'd Dr Lynn Arnold AO led a discussion about the abortion legislation before parliament at our meeting in March.

In August, we were delighted to meet with Bishop Denise Ferguson. Our December meeting takes place at my home where we share a "Christmas" lunch, blessed by the fine Christmas puddings made by the Parish of Parkside!

#### **BROADVIEW & ENFIELD**

The Parish of Broadview and Enfield comprises

of three congregations: St Philip's, St Clement's, and the CSI Malayalam Congregation. These congregations have separate worship timings on Sundays – however the fellowship is strengthened through combined worship services on every fifth Sundays and through the patronal festivals during which all come together. 'Curry lunch' or sumptuous fellowship meals are followed during such occasions.

The Parish had several special occasions such as Feast of Francis of Assisi & the Blessing of Pets, Feast of St Luke, All Saints' Day, Remembrance Day worship, Kerala Love Feast, Harvest Thanksgiving Festival, Prospect Spring Fair, Sunday School Finale, Talent Day, New Year's Eve Watch Night and Covenant Service, Christmas 'Carol Nite', and the Carol Rounds during which time a team from all three Congregations had visited parishioners with carols.

During this year the Parish has supported the Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes, the Anglicare SA's Christmas Hampers & Magdalene Centre, the BCA, the ABM, the Christmas Bowl, the Leukaemia Foundation, Kerala Flood victims in south India, the Catherine House, and the Cancer Council by organising the Australia's Biggest Morning.

We have a sound children's ministry. Other major programs of the Parish include Knit 'n Natter fellowship, Centering Prayer and Lectio Divina, Advent and Lenten meditations and Bible study sessions, Car-boot sales, Autumn Fair, Book and Toy sale, and ministry to Oakwood and Bupa Aged care facilities. The team spirit of the Parish Council is tremendous that brings fabulous results in the life of the Parish.

Rev'd Santhosh S Kumar Parish Priest The outreach ministry of Christ Church takes many and diverse forms. I understand the focus of this ministry is to try to draw people towards our faith community, believing that we together have a wonderful and unique liturgical tradition, which is done with such care that it has the potential to stir up languishing faith or convert those who are seeking faith. We have the gift of an undefeatable joy through the power of the Holy Spirit outpoured through our ministry of scripture, sacrament, and tradition, and together we are able to bring healing and hope to the broken in body, mind and spirit.

The largest growth area of the parish has been the playgroup. This group meets on Friday mornings of term time. Jean Bain and Briar Newman professionally lead the playgroup with the support of some wonderful parents and grandparents and myself. On Friday mornings the hall is filled with the excited sounds of small children delighting in the activities offered to them. We are a multicultural group, with families from many nations. Whilst we do not attempt to convert families to Anglicanism, many ask deep spiritual questions, and a number have found their way back to church, particularly for our occasional services around Church festivals, including Easter, Pentecost, St. Francis's Day and most successful of all Christmas Eve Children's Service.

A significant challenge remains for us, to explore ways of reaching out to our local community. We hope to do this through activities and groups which create opportunities for us to share our faith in God though Jesus and in the power of the Holy Spirit, through our being together, as much as through our words and prayers.

#### HOLY TRINITY

#### PROSPECT / KILBURN

The past year has been both a year of continuity and a year of change. Faithful worship continues at both locations, St Christopher Kilburn and St Cuthbert, Prospect. We delight in the quality of our choir which enhances worship and is a gift to the wider community at events like the Kilburn RSL Anzac Day commemoration and the Christmas Carol Service at St Cuthbert's church.

The annual Martyrs' Day Sung Evensong at which the New Guinea martyrs are remembered (in particular Lilla Lashmar, a former parishioner of St Cuthbert's) was well attended.

AnglicareSÁ continues to use the facilities at Prospect though they are no longer using Kilburn Hall.

The ordained leadership of the Parish has changed. On September 30th, 2018 the Parish farewelled and thanked Fr John Stephenson who had served as locum for 12 months. Fr David Thornton-Wakeford then served as locum in the weeks prior to the arrival of the new Priest-in-Charge Archdeacon Lyn McRostie who was commissioned on 8th November. She is a 0.5 FTE appointment.

We are yet to develop a Mission Action Plan. It is a goal for 2020.

St Cyprian's Church, Melbourne St, North Adelaide, possessor of a splendid rose garden, continues to hold its worship service at 9.30 each Sunday morning. The worship pattern consists of an APBA Sung Eucharist on the first Sunday [and fifth Sundays when they occur] in each month, with BCP Sung Eucharists on the remaining 2nd, 3rd and 4th Sundays. Morning tea is held in the hall at the rear of the church after the service on every 2nd Sunday. Eucharistic services for selected Saints' Feast Days are also held on weekday evenings on several occasions during the year.

During 2018/19 attendance figures for Sunday services have fluctuated between 21 and 35 with the average being around 26. Several previously regularly attending members of the congregation have succumbed to serious illnesses, necessitating hospital or home visit communions. Long-serving People's Warden, Mary Cheesman, and her husband, Reverend Andrew Cheesman, recently retired from parish life. Parish Council meets at approximately two-monthly intervals.

Events of note during the past 12 months have included the Patronal Festival on the second Sunday in September, 2018, with the then Archdeacon, Gwilym Henry-Edwards, welcomed as guest preacher. More recently, Archbishop Geoff Smith and his wife Lynn visited us with the Archbishop celebrating the Eucharist and preaching an insightful sermon on the Parable of the Rich Fool before enjoying fellowship with the parishioners at morning tea.

The Reverend Grant Moore is currently acting as locum tenens until the end of 2019.

St John's connections with various local organisations and people continue to challenge and deepen our vocation to care for the marginalised in this city. An immediate connection point is through the 'coal-face' ministry of our parish op shop. Our volunteers are good friends with regulars from all walks of life. And St John's Youth Services is a wonderful agency born from the parish whose offices are on-site. Then there's our partnership with St Mary Magdalene's, the Cathedral and Anglicare in oversight of the Magdalene Centre. And in the past year, we've cemented a bond with St Luke's Whitmore Square, offering regular food support to their Mission. We also work with the Hutt Street Centre, Halifax Street Children's Centre and Pre-School and the Dulwich Centre, and provide chaplaincy support at St Andrew's Hospital.

The complexity of life for marginalised people is also part of our daily life as a congregation as we share God's love and offer practical support with our diverse membership. Copies of our Sunday Bible readings need to be printed regularly in Farsi, Bislama, Portuguese and occasionally Mandarin; a diversity delightfully present in our children's corner most Sundays.

St John's is also home to three choirs in addition to the parish choir, and is the venue of choice for a wide variety of musical groups and soloists. We're also an examination centre for distance-students of universities from many far-distant places. And all this is on top of our provision of regular pastoral services to a very wide community which, in October this year, will have known St John's as a spiritual home for 180 years. So hospitality is the other major ministry we see as our special vocation.

It is a joy to belong to such a diverse, generous, welcoming community.

#### ST MARY MAGDALENE'S

St Mary Magdalene's, Adelaide is a parish in the Anglo-Catholic tradition and has had a history of involvement in fine worship and music, and a commitment to active outreach ministry to the marginalised and those in need. This outreach for the last two decades has been actively partnered with the Magdalene Centre, and also the Collective of St Mary Magdalene (COSSM), as well as the ministry of the people and clergy of the parish community.

The Parish still continues to be a partner with The Magdalene Centre, an agency of Anglicare, even though the Administrative Office is no longer in the Mission Hall in Moore Street, nor the Bargain Centre at Carrington Street. A lot of thought, prayer and discussion is continuing about re-envisioning the parish outreach ministry to which we remain committed.

COSSM continues to operate a Saturday night Drop-In Centre meal. This is a three-course meal and is staffed by volunteers. Parishes, schools, some businesses and other organisations donate and prepare the meal on a rostered basis.

The Mission Hall also provides a weekly venue for two AA groups and also for two Narcotics'

# Anonymous group.

A Weekly Art Group, open to all, meets to provide an opportunity for support of a cohort of individuals which has a variety of special, social and other needs.

Over the last few years this group has participated in the SA Living Artist (SALA)Festival ... and members have gradually taken responsibility for the full organisation of this.

One highlight of the Church's Year has been an Annual Celebration on the Feast of Corpus Christi to give thanks for Holy Communion and also to pray for the City and its people. The service concludes with an outdoor Procession and Blessing of the City. This is always quite lovely.

We were pleased to be the first parish to host Bishop Denise, and look forward to a continuing and growing relationship with her.

#### ST PETER'S CATHEDRAL

#### Introduction

Could Bishop Augustus Short possibly have imagined today's St Peter's Cathedral when he laid the foundation stone one hundred and fifty years ago? The building has changed little since its completion, giving to Adelaide a beautiful and iconic building, its spires soaring over the parklands. The Cathedral, however, is far more than the sum of the stones, timber and stained glass. It is more than the generosity of benefactors through the years. It is a sacred space, with worship as its heartbeat.

## Sacred Space: Worship

From the quiet early morning weekday Eucharists to the grand occasions marking the great

Christian festivals, the Cathedral is a sacred space of worship. The Cathedral Choir (formed in 1876) sings three choral services a week, embracing the exciting traditions of Anglican choral music which continue to grow and develop. Today's Choir is very different from the early days of exclusively boys and men (mostly Anglo). Reflecting the diversity of today's congregations, both choir and serving teams include girls and boys, men and women, from a wide range of cultures and languages.

As Mother Church of the Diocese, the Cathedral hosts numerous 'special' services which gather the Diocese together for synod, ordinations and chrism Eucharists as well as hosting annual services for St Barnabas College, the Mothers' Union, and our Anglican Schools.

## Thinking Space: Conversation and Education

A not uncommon comment from people is that they do not have to 'leave their brains at the door'. A team of preachers ensures that a wide range of preaching styles is offered while the use of the Revised Common Lectionary prods preachers to move beyond their favourite biblical texts and themes and explore what are sometimes challenging and uncomfortable passages. A 'ladder' approach is taken to Christian Education, recognizing that people are at different stages in their faith development and so have different needs. For those new to faith, the Pilgrim course offers preparation leading to baptism and confirmation. Regular book and film studies stimulate conversation and transformation. Education for Ministry (EfM) offers rigorous study of scripture, Church history and theology. Occasional preaching series and lectures bring faith matters into the public square.

The building itself has its own educational value, as those who avail themselves of the regular

weekly tours discover. With over a hundred special focus tours booked each year Cathedral Tour Guides are a fount of knowledge on architecture, stained glass windows, fabric and liturgical vestments and stories of the people who have been the living stones.

## Generous Space: Gracious Hospitality

From people of deep faith to those of none, all find a welcome at the Cathedral, open daily 9.30am – 4.00pm. The pin-maps are a firm favourite with tourists from across the world. eagerly seeking out their town or village and making their mark.

The Cathedral is a venue for concerts suiting a range of musical styles and tastes. Art shows, poster and photographic exhibitions draw attention to the creative spirit of humankind reflecting the joys and tragedies of our world.

Cathedrals lend themselves to being spaces of both lament and celebration. In the week after Easter 2019 members of the Sri Lankan community knelt in silent vigil, lighting candles and weeping for loved ones back home. The following day hundreds of Adelaideans poured through the doors following the ANZAC Day parade – enjoying a much-needed coffee and Anzac biscuit provided by the Friends of the Cathedral, and exploring 'their' cathedral. Each February MPs gather to pray before the opening of the parliamentary year.

# Transforming Space: Outreach to City and State

"Go in peace to love and serve the Lord." With these words worshipers are sent out of the Cathedral into the world. And off they go, to live as God's people in their 'day jobs' as teacher, nurse, lawyer, carpenter, engineer, parent, student, volunteer. It's the combination of worship, education and open door, the focus on loving

God and neighbour, that moves people to care for other people both near and far as well as the environment in all its glorious complexity. An iconic part of the Adelaide skyline, who can really tell how the twin spires speak to those who watch the cricket 'from the Cathedral end'. who see the backdrop behind the newsreader or take numerous photos to post on social media? Clergy and lay people regularly enjoy conversations with people who have been touched, often years before, by some aspect of St Peter's Cathedral – during time spent in the Women's and Children's Hospital, a long ago school carol service, a funeral or wedding, hearing the bells, or simply walking past on the way to work. People frequently express a sense of 'coming home'.

# Imagining Space: the Future

"Celebrating the Past – Imagining the Future" is the tagline for Festival 150, with celebrations throughout 2019. But what of the future? Is there indeed a future for sacred spaces such as St Peter's Cathedral? In 2018 Stage 1 of a major and long-term Conservation Project was begun. This will only be achieved if the generosity of the past is repeated in our times. Of one thing I have no doubt at all. If St Peter's Cathedral remains true to its central core business – the worship of God – there will be a future. Quite what it will look like remains an open question.

#### WALKERVILLE

St. Andrew's, Walkerville has enjoyed a busy 170th year in ministry. A new mid-week service offers the opportunity for people to gather around the altar and then continue fellowship over lunch together. The revamped community Market Day draws people from the community

to the browse the many stalls, enjoy a sausage sizzle or scones and coffee, and to engage with others. The relationship with St. Andrew's School continues to blossom, with opportunities to welcome the students each week to Chapel, and to share in combined Church / School worship twice a year.

- The ministry to young families has increased over the year, as the numbers of families regularly attending has grown. A number of the young children have been admitted to Communion, and some are training as Servers and taking on other liturgical roles, a sign to the rest of the congregation of their important role within the community.
- Regular pastoral and liturgical ministry continues to Allity Residential Care, with fortnightly services led by the Rev'd Helen Gibson-White. The relationship with Management and residents is strong, and a number of the congregation also volunteer in pastoral roles within Allity.
- A major building project has just begun, with the bells being removed from the bell-tower and returned to the UK for refurbishment and repair. The community will notice their absence, with the bells and clock expected to be silent for almost 12 months. We look forward to their return, and to the ceremonial re-opening of the Tower in 2020 – it will be a big event.

#### BURNSIDE

It would be true to say that the Parish of Burnside is seeking to flourish again.

Like many others in our deanery St David's has flourished in many and various ways over the years in all aspects of what it means to be 'church'. To continue to do so we are endeavouring to marshal and reorganise our diminishing numbers, resources and energies to connect and reconnect to the various communities our parish has natural links to. One example is how our pastoral care and outreach committees have amalgamated to take a more holistic approach to spreading the love of God to those in need of help and take a more intergenerational approach in doing so.

From our playgroup to our community lunches, weekday services and Sunday afternoon concerts we are seeking to provide handles of connection to the various communities these activities represent. We have been inspired by the Vision 2022 and seeking to apply the various goals in all these areas.

#### CAMPBELLTOWN

Finally, last April the new building project and completed. The new commercial kitchen has been used for a number of functions along with Martin's space community hub. Recently, Bishop Chris McLeod spoke at our Seasonal Conversations about reconciliation and his own family history. We normally have four of these forums per year followed by a meal. These are normally very well attended. We need to finish some works on-site and are planting, fencing and finishing some projects that have been in the pipeline for some years. These will be completed

by the end of the year.

On the 15th of September at our 9 am Eucharist we had the pleasure of welcoming The Right Rev'd Denise Ferguson to celebrate, preach, open and bless Martin's space. The service was very well attended. Invitations were extended to the local Mayor, Politicians, Siebert's Funeral Directors (who lease our chapel) and others who were part of the building project.

We received a number of grants that help with some of the overheads.

We have enclosed Reggie's shed which will open on the fourth Saturday of the month from 9 am -12noon. Reggie's shed sells records, tapes, CDs, DVDs, books, BRIC and Brac, and furniture. Soon we will be selling clothes hence the upgrade of the shed. We will then be opening the shop weekly and while the shop is operating we will be opening a cafe from our new Martin's space. We hoping this will happen every Thursday.

In the future, we will run a number of activities, classes, and workshops from Martin's space also. We are excited about our growth potential.

We have recently completed a playground area for children.

Chat and Chew are ministries provided by the people's warden (Darian Leckie). He bakes a variety of sweet and savory delights on the fourth Saturday of the months and is open to teaching people how to make his fare. He is assisted by our Community Co-ordinator (Caralyn Lammas) who is doing a wonderful job at networking the parish into the local community via the Campbelltown Council and other bodies.

We continue to provide a vibrant and exciting Souls Whispers Program which includes are a variety of bible studies, workshops, etc.

The last three of our stain glass windows will be installed next year in the Chapel as all the window needed replacing and restoring.

The parish has had another amazing year and we pray that through the power of the Holy Spirit will continue to bless us.

## Grace Anglican Network

Incorporating the Parishes of Kensington & Norwood

The Grace Anglican Network has again had a year of significant transition. In December 2018, Shane Ellery was ordained as Deacon. Shane continues to oversee the 5pm young Adults gathering and has also been assisting with our 8:30 Traditional service. In February this year we welcomed Nat Reuss as an Associate Priest to oversee the Norwood 10am gathering. Nat has settled well into the network. Another significant transition has been the announcement of the moving of Sam Bleby to take up a Senior Minister position in Melbourne. Sam's last Sunday was held on 18 August. Along with this the decision was made to bring the Grace Church St Morris gathering to an end. After 5 years of ministry, their last service was held on Sunday 1 September. The ministries of Grace International Fellowship, held at St Morris, will continue as a Grace Network ministry and outreach.

We are very thankful for the vibrant community of Grace network of all ages. Our ministries are either site specific or network wide. Our youth ministry is across our network and this year students from year 7 have been incorporated into

the program. Our youth group also links with other groups through Refine and Redef.

Both our Norwood and Kensington sites have developed a strong relationship with the Moore Street Dinners, and it has been great to see how this has enabled relationship between the different gatherings to develop.

The Network has gone through an intentional prayer and listening process as part of our vision development. This will lead to the development of our Mission Action Plans. The Council will develop a plan that looks at the way we will work as a network and then each of the gatherings will develop plans that are specific to the situation and demographic.

#### PAYNEHAM

St. Aidan's are currently being challenged by the impact of some land being acquired by the Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure for the widening of lanes for the very busy intersection of OG and Payneham Road. As this is Synod property, Diocesan Office are guiding us through a process which is rather daunting for our congregation.

We find as with all things, we are called to place our trust and hope in God, and then to get on with the ministry tasks that are part of our daily parish life. We continue our outreach among the wider community, with Café Church, the Op Shop, Aged Care services, supporting the work of Anglicare with donations to The Mary Magdalene Centre and in partnership with our Big Table Morning Tea. We actively participate Ecumenically with three shared services a year, including the World Day of Prayer. Together we currently support Pastoral Support Workers at two of our local schools with another school also

coming on board. Fourteen people took part in this year's ABM Lenten study A Voice in the Wilderness: Listening to the Statement from the Heart, by Celia Kemp. A member of our group felt called to respond by writing letters to our local members of parliament, just prior to the elections, for their responses to this issue. We are about to start a new Bible Study group looking at the Sunday readings, encouraging growth in discipleship and faith sharing. We are now a small parish and it is increasingly more difficult to do all that we would like to do but working together we do the best we can. We continue to trust that God will be able to use the gifts we have and to achieve more than we think is possible.

#### ST PETER'S

After 17 years, the congregation bid farewell to the Reverend Andy Wurm and his family in December 2018. Many members stepped up to take on the additional responsibilities during the vacancy that ensued. We are grateful to the Reverend Tony Tamblyn who stepped in to do a locum and to the Reverends Tim Sherwell and Tony Cox for assisting with services.

In July, the Parish welcomed the new Priest, the Reverend Julia Denny-Dimitriou, in a joyful Commissioning service attended by some 180 people from several local Anglican communities. At the time of writing she is settling into the community of All Souls', who are enjoying getting to know her, and she us.

We look forward to picking up and continuing the work of 'reinvigorating the church community' identified in the 2018 Synod Report, particularly to exploring 'points of connection to the local community' with a view to facilitating Vision 2022.

## Restoration of the Church

Parish Council continues to put time and energy into the restoration of the fabric of All Souls, including securing support from the National Trust to enable work to be done on the very beautiful Morris Windows, which are in need of urgent attention.

Refurbishment of the Rectory is under way and our thanks go to the parishioners who take care of the Rectory and Church gardens.

# Winter Appeal

This annual event has been very successful and All Souls acknowledges the generosity of the wider community. We thank all the volunteers who gave time to letter drop, collect donations and deliver these to the Magdalene Centre.

#### THE BAROSSA

The Parish is going well and we seem to be busy.

Some of the highlights so far have been the Archbishop coming up to visit and bless the Frontals of Angaston; Australia Day was celebrated with gusto and Candlemas was also a great joy with the Mayor of The Barossa preaching with the local brass band playing.

After a long time, we got a faculty for the air-conditioners and for the installation of the memorial window for Lady Downer. Bishop Keith came up and preached.

"Meet N Eat", the community meal that happens monthly, continues to go on after ten years. This is a very good community engagement. The Parish Op Shops are doing well; they enrich community and provide money to the Parish. We have also had successful parish dinners, mini organ concerts, and have worked hard to upgrade the gardens in Nuriootpa and Angaston. Also, we have become compliant with fire extinguishers and fire blankets across the Parish.

The Patronal Festival continues to be engaging and provide a nice point of coming together across the five centres. We as a parish also enjoy our interactions with Kapunda Parish by engaging in shared worship and fellowship. We have had some nice interactions with various Lutheran parishes and their preachers. Also, we engage in a weekly ecumenical prayer meeting in which we pray for the world and bask in the power of the spirit.

Finally, we have also developed a social club,

which plays cards, games and various other things and is proving to be quite popular.

The Parish is greatly assisted by its lay-leaders, Lutheran organists and assistant priests and the generosity of many – thanks be to God.

#### **ELIZABETH**

At Holy Cross, the church meets people in the midst of the realities of life and shows itself willing to accept, assist and support others as they can. In this way, the Holy Cross community demonstrates faith in action as much as in word. Participation in the life of the Holy Cross community frequently extends beyond attendance at Sunday church services through Bible Studies, Lenten groups, Men's Breakfast, Friday Morning Fellowship, The Prayer Chain, Hospital and School Chaplaincy, Nursing Home Ministry, pastoral contact and shared hospitality

Our city centre location and co-location with Anglicare is also a significant strength on which we can build for the future. We have increased our mid-week presence on this site to make the most of our central location. We have begun meeting regularly for Morning Prayer and we celebrate the Eucharist together on Fridays. Importantly, we are seeking to develop a friendly and welcoming community space where relationships are deepened through Christian hospitality.

We have a real opportunity to become a highly visible City-Centre Church which is engaged with people in the heart of Playford's community and commercial life (possibly named 'Playford City Anglican Church'). In time, it is our hope (in God's grace) to develop a church that reaches out to the whole of the City of

Playford, but our priority and focus starts with building up the church at the centre so that it can most effectively support ministry initiatives further afield.

The first part of achieving this vision has been to develop a form of worship which is accessible and is meaningful for those who have no experience of our prayer book tradition. This service is called "On the Way," reflecting both our location on Elizabeth Way, and a sense of the ongoing journey of faith. It is a highly relational, interactive and creative service, which we hope will engage people of all ages and stages of life and faith. It is held at 11.00 on Sunday mornings and includes Communion each week.

Anglican mission and ministry in Elizabeth have benefitted significantly through the partnership between Anglicare-SA and Holy Cross. In recent times, Anglicare has significantly increased their financial support for ministry, alongside the grass-roots collaboration in various events and activities.

The need for an all-new building for the Elizabeth Mission has raised the question of the longer-term needs for the church building. Very constructive discussions with Anglicare have led to the proposal that Anglican plan and build an extensive, custom-designed building to cater for both the Anglicare-SA Mission and a new church complex.

A City-Centre Church in a most strategic location and with new facilities, with a desire to innovate and initiate ministry across the City of Playford and beyond means it is an exciting time to be where we are. Gathering people and community is at the heart of what it means to be the church (it's what the word 'church' means!), and we believe God is going before us in creating

opportunities and providing for our mission and ministry in ways beyond our present knowing.

#### **ELIZABETH DOWNS**

Under the leadership of Fr Piers Davey, Elizabeth Downs continues as a faithful, prayerful, worshipping community aware of the needs in the community around us.

With that awareness, we continue, together with Anglicare and the Quickest Warmth Project, our Mission and Outreach into our local community. This includes the monthly Fellowship lunches, providing toiletry items for the Lyell McEwin Emergency Department, knitting and sewing items, donating household items and providing non-perishable food for Anglicare's Mission, Families SA and Indigenous communities. We host Anglicare's Bobbins and Banter, Tablet and Art Groups, and act as a customer pick-up and drop-off point.

A small working group from the Parish Council and Anglicare are currently looking at the possibility of entering into a covenant as a means to better serve the wider community in Elizabeth Downs.

We continue to host a Work for the Dole Scheme giving participants the opportunity to learn new skills and involvement in community activities. Some of the volunteers have never been inside a church before and show an interest by asking questions and reading the Gospel which is always on show on the Altar.

Aware of our own needs also, we continue the weekly Tuesday meditation on the Bible readings for the following Sunday, Healing Service on Wednesday, Morning Prayer on Friday and the monthly Mothers' Union meetings

for prayer, reflection, and fellowship. We also spend time together after the Sunday Mass over Morning Tea which once a month includes soup and sandwich. As well as involvement in these, some of our members volunteer in the Playford Council's community outreach activities and at St Peter's Cathedral.

We have also undertaken several maintenance projects in and around the church. We have renovated the Rectory which we now lease to private individuals. We have installed Solar Panels on the parish hall's roof and in the hall itself - we now have three excellent Split-level heaters. Our grounds continue to be well maintained.

#### **GAWLER**

Some of the highlights of 2018 include:

- Parish Council 'Awayday' in Starplex Upper Room where we scoped our Mission Action Plan (MAP).
- Lent Groups were ecumenical last year and Gawler Anglicans were predominant in both groups.
- Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper was very enjoyable, favourable comments made re. new format.
- The new pattern of services for Holy Week and Easter went really well and the positive feedback suggests that we've got the formula right!
- A good Pastoral review with the Archbishop at which he said that St George's Patronal Festival was a good occasion and that the Parish appeared to be in good heart!
- Trinity College Senior Choir sang at Michele Chambers' funeral - more working together!

- KaDenCe choir held a Nine Lessons and Carols service in St George's which was again well-received
- Christmas services were reasonably well-attended and well-received.
- In December we launched our website gawleranglicans.org!

## **Looking Forward**

Strategically making an effort to 'line up' our parish life and activities with the goals that we identified in our MAP is bearing fruit in more intentional, targeted use of resources, gifts, time and energy. Regular daily prayers and intercessions at the Eucharist will serve to strengthen all that we do as we seek to grow deeper into God's love and closer to each other in Christ Jesus our Lord.

#### COROMANDEL VALLEY

Incorporating All Hallows' Blackwood; St John's Coromandel Valley

Alongside worship, social and community engagement projects, we have enjoyed opportunities for exploring and growing in faith using courses such as "The Life of Jesus" (CPX – Centre for Public Christianity, Dr John Dickson) and a year-long exploration of the Bible in a Discipleship Course authored and presented by The Rev'd Martin Bleby. In events such as this we are usually joined by members of our neighbouring Belair Parish.

My role as Parish Priest changed in March 2019 to 0.5 FTE due to a new Diocesan role, necessitating a broader teamwork approach to parish ministry. It has been a pleasure to have The Rev'ds Gary Priest and Martin Bleby formally contracted as ministry associates, offering significant contributions of teaching, preaching and pastoral ministries. We hoped to broaden this, perhaps with an additional part-time person, but have not yet achieved this. The Parish have been supportive especially as the associates and their spouses are long-term trusted members of the parish.

We have not progressed far with the MAP process. Our previous change processes initiated before diocesan adoption of MAP were not successful as initially envisaged: Experimental and experiential shared worship with Belair to extend the natural shared ministry already begun prior to my arrival in the parish. The intention was to consider a future amalgamation with varied possible formats in order to bolster local ministry, enable new ventures and enjoy the natural benefits of "critical mass" in 2 venues instead of 3. There was insufficient support to seriously pursue this. Other possible new ventures within the parish, which has two small but distinct congregations and two sets of church properties within less than 2km of each other, are now under consideration.

#### **FULLARTON**

The Parish has been well served by Rev. Jeff Oake and Rev. Mark Sibly as locums.

The Nomination Committee and the Diocesan nominators have been meeting with the Archbishop and are hopeful of an appointment by the end of the year. We look forward to developing a new parish vision with a new priest in 2020.

#### **HAWTHORN**

We were very pleased to welcome The Rev'd Michael Rogers to the parish staff after his ordination as a deacon in December. Michael had been working in the parish as part of his training, making particular use of his musical skills in the alternative "Almost Like Church" service which is held twice a month for families. It follows the plan of the liturgy but is more interactive for the congregation, particularly the children. Michael is working half-time in the parish, and for the other half of his time he continues his ministry as a chaplain at Flinders Medical Centre.

In another ministry a member of the parish has been conducting fortnightly Sunday services at the facility known as Disability SA Highgate Campus, formerly the Julia Farr Centre. As the residents have all been moved out of the Centre there was the important question of where they would be able to receive a continuing ministry. For some weeks several people came to St Columba's and participated in the service. Now they have all been relocated to community housing and are finding their worship opportunities closer to their homes.

One ministry which has run its course is "Columba Nights", which met for an informal reflective gathering on Sunday evenings. The leader moved on to other callings, and the group disbanded. We may never know the extent to which this ministry has planted seeds or encour-

aged people who had once known about the Christian faith.

Our Lent Studies looked at a selection of topics from the comprehensive Anglican series "Keep the Faith", which offers many openings for further study.

Parish Council has paid particular attention to Risk Management, and the links between the Diocesan Vision and our Mission Action Plan.

The Annual Fete continues to provide our major source of income for mission giving, and is locally popular, reminding our community that St Columba's is there for them.

#### **MITCHAM**

Over the last 12 months the Parish of Mitcham has continued to build upon a firm foundation that has enabled us to move to the development of a comprehensive Mission Action Plan.

#### **PARKSIDE**

St Oswald's is a diverse, imaginative, and faithful parish, with creative ministries in music and spirituality, as well as youth and children's ministries. This year, it welcomed our new parish priest The Rev'd Steven Ogden and his wife Anne, refurbished the rectory, and began planning new mission initiatives.

On reflection, two issues emerged. First, there has been a paradigm shift in society, and churches are now peripheral organisations. Second, we have been called to be an open Christ-like space, removing walls, making connections in the public square (Gal 3:28). So, we developed a Mission Action Plan.

With strategic planners Lee and Gloria Parker, we held two parish planning meetings and one Parish Council planning meeting. At the first parish meeting, we recorded parishioners' ideas. From this, the Parish Council met and identified

major objectives. At a second parish meeting, objectives were discussed, and augmented, and initial implementation steps outlined. Based on the objectives, we are setting up working groups, in liaison with parish council, in these areas:

- 1. The development of our parish profile (e.g. website, signs), which includes a staged and costed site-plan.
- 2. A mission outreach/social justice program in disability, which includes theological reflection, a more accessible site, and educational programs.
- 3. A mission outreach/social justice program with LGBTIQ persons, which includes theological reflection, and education programs on the nature of human identity.
- 4. Developing growth and evangelism programs, addressing local areas of urban renewal. It includes strengthening our children and youth programs, consulting youth members, and working collaboratively in our region.
- 5. Developing our music and spirituality programs. With music, this includes everything from becoming a concert centre to working with our centre for spirituality. With spirituality, this includes supporting the existing program, its leaders and participants, and working closely with our music program.

## **STIRLING**

#### UNLEY

Unley Parish continues to experience God's mercy and blessing since the last Synod. At the end of 2018, both assistant clergy, The Rev'd Mark

Peterson and The Rev'd Samuel Chan resigned. That effected both Sunday congregations and in particular the second service. The new year began with a smaller number for both congregations, but there was still an abiding positive attitude which was clearly seen in the members' love for one other. By God's grace, there was a significant change in the culture of the congregation that resulted in a cohesive and encouraging experience for all.

- 1. The full Parish status. The Parish reinstated a full Parish Council at the Annual Vestry Meeting in March 2019. Progress has been made to work towards a more focused and motivated gospel ministry.
- 2. The Op Shop, Aggies has moved back into the Church Hall with minor disruption. The establishment continues to enjoy an excellent reputation and has continued to contribute significantly to the vibrant life of Unley. According to positive reviews in Never Pay Retail, Aggies is ranked First in the top five most celebrated second hand retailers in Adelaide. This has provided us some great opportunities to connect with the community, which has been a great way to continue to share the good news to others and to be a tangible blessing to the community.
- 3. The newly renovated old school building is again another potential for the Parish to make direct contact with the children and their families in the local community.
- 4. As St Augustine's continues to contribute more actively to the local community, this has afforded more opportunities to reach more people with the gospel. While this exists in significant part through the existing pastoral care ministries to local Christians, the church intends to double our efforts to find new ways to connect others with the gospel message of

our risen Lord. This can be primarily achieved through existing contact with our customers at Aggies, the existing Children's Services and some specific outreach programs.

It is our prayer that by our next meeting, we will be able to share more exciting news with you about God's faithfulness to our community, with particular how that you might join us in welcoming new believers who comes to know our Lord Jesus Christ within the next few months.

#### CLARENCE GARDENS

Our parish focus over the past 12 months has been to live into our Vision and to discern its practical aspects. We have enjoyed this discernment process as a means of growing in discipleship and learning from each other. The desire our vision creates in us – for ourselves, our neighbourhood, and our world – is one in which we find wholeness, community, and transformation. We are currently refining these three strands into concrete actions for the next three years in our 2022 Action Plan. Of course, God doesn't wait until we have our paperwork in order, and we have been blessed along the way with opportunities for mission and growth that reflect this vision.

One very exciting initiative has been the opportunity to give L'Arche Adelaide a new home with us, and they now hold their regular gatherings in our community centre. We conduct a quarterly combined service with L'Arche, followed by a shared lunch, and have been blessed by the experience of vitality and joy brought by this relationship.

In our wider ministry we have funded a local minister in Myanmar, as he teaches young people English and music. This is facilitated through the ministries of the Rev'd David Amery and his wife Coralie who are regular guests in the parish. We have also supported one of our own parishioners with the gift of bibles for her mission in the Solomon Islands and have offered again our education bursary for Aboriginal students within the Anglican school system.

Our Sunday worship is the heartbeat of our community, and we have set a pattern this year with a Service of Healing and Reconciliation on the first Sunday of the month, and our Family Focus Sunday on the third Sunday. In January we held a 'Back to School Blessing' for young people and Pastoral Support Workers and will be soon holding a 'Celebration of Ageing' service. In the lead-up to our Feast day of Saint Francis we celebrate the Season of Creation, culminating in the Blessing of Animals and celebration of Saint Francis Day with a parish lunch. The wider community were invited to our Blessing of Animals, and with a petting zoo and donkey rides this proved to be very popular with young and old alike!

In 2019 we have piloted a monthly evening Prayer and Praise service, followed by dinner together. It is hoped that this alternative time and relaxed contemporary format will encourage those on our parish fringe. We have been delighted to welcome newcomers in our midst and saddened at the loss of others into aged care. We continue to fellowship together through various social activities and have an active Pastoral Care team who ensure that no one is inadvertently

forgotten about or overlooked.

As we continue to grow and learn together and to serve our community we regularly pray: 'May God stir our imagination, sharpen our vision, and give us wisdom and courage to reveal the Kingdom of God in our community with love and joy. Amen!'

'Just 4 US' is a group whose fellowship focus is for those who live alone and often they meet over a shared meal. Our Quiz night was a wonderful community event and raised money for the floor of our hall and toward Fiji School Sigatoka.

Christmas time at the children's youth service we saw 90 attend that service with some families and children being part of Surf Life Saving Club, Baptismal families, youth and some of the grandchildren of the parishioners. A delightful mix!

New initiative this year, we have just put our Mission Action Plan together from now till 2022. Already from that plan we have just started a new youth group that seeks to go monthly bowling with a view to meld the group to work toward confirmation and then serving in the church as readers and servers.

We also seek to run an Alpha course with those who have already been in the church awhile along with those who have come over the past couple of years. To strengthen what we have and to introduce a deeper understanding of discipleship with others on their journey.

We have been very blessed to serve and pray for the communities we are so privileged to walk alongside. 'To God be the Glory'.

#### ST MARYS

The Anglican Parish of St. Mary's continued to proclaim the Good News of the Risen Lord to the people of St. Marys' suburb and the sur-

rounding suburbs. We are an active community of faith that engages in mission and ministry to the local and the wider community.

We have solar panels on the roof and an environmentally friendly car park as well We hope our small community garden will amalgamate with the development on the adjoining reserve. We work hard to recycle our waste appropriately

#### Volunteering

The community visitors' scheme auspice where volunteers visit lonely people in Residential Aged Care Homes has its origins in our parish. We still have over the required twenty volunteers for our auspice.

People from our parish attend the Marion council Community Forum and on an individual basis people volunteer with Meals on Wheels and Rotary.

Fund raising is a must in this parish. However, it has its advantages because it brings people together socially. We have some great times.

# **WESTERN SUBURBS DEANERY**

Firstly I wish to thank my colleagues from the Western Suburbs Deanery for their continued encouragement and support in this role. The fabulous Western Suburbs Deanery continues to meet once a month and is hosted by members at various parishes, aged care facilities, and the Queen Elizabeth Hospital (TQEH).

We are a diverse group of people, representing different traditions, with the same vision to grow in discipleship and service, and to share the good news of Jesus Christ to all people in our various contexts.

We generally hold informal meetings where we bring along questions, concerns, and share stories from our parishes and chaplaincy roles. We continue to discuss how we may improve connecting with one another to, in part, reflect our Diocesan Vision 2022. Recently our focus has been on the development and implementation of our Mission Action Plans.

Over the last twelve months we have invited guest speakers to the meetings. Some include Garry Peschel, Senior Manager at Anglicare Grange; Heather Banham, Clinical Manager/NUM Transition Care Programmer, Falls Prevention Service, TQEH Placement Service, CALHN; and Craig Bossie, Manager Wellness and Spiritual Care Services, Allied Health, CALHN. We also met with some of TQEH hospital chaplains from various denominations, which was very informative as they shared stories of their roles.

It was a great pleasure to welcome and invite Bishop Denise Ferguson to a deanery meeting and luncheon. This was a wonderful opportunity for us to meet Bishop Denise in a relaxed atmosphere, to hear something of her journey, and also for her to get to know us and hear something of our parishes, chaplaincies, and story.

#### CROYDON

The past year at St Barnabas has involved a number of challenges. A number of families have moved to other parts of the city or state, our income has reduced significantly as a result, and an architect's fabric report revealed that our buildings require extensive and expensive repairs in the next few years.

At the same time, there is much to give thanks for: One single woman has been approved as a CMS gospel worker and two married couples have begun the CMS application process, one young man is undertaking the Ministry Apprenticeship Program, and we have undertaken a number of new outreach activities in the local community including an Alpha course, Mainly Music group and Bible study group at a local detention centre. We have a growing number of children, including several who are adopted or fostered. That makes for a lively community but also means that almost everyone has their hands full! We are currently going through a Mission Action Planning process and are finding it useful in clarifying our purpose and prioritising our ministries.

We have enjoyed partnership with other local churches in presenting the Christmas message in the local primary schools and in engaging with the Thy Kingdom Come prayer initiative and Pentecost celebration. We also put on another production of the Mark Drama in the 2019

Adelaide Fringe with actors drawn from 10 different churches around the city.

Perhaps most encouraging has been a recent conviction amongst a number of people that we need to pray together. This has resulted in record numbers at our monthly prayer meeting and almost immediate answers to prayer seen in new people coming to our services on Sundays.

So, in the present season at Barneys we feel pretty weak and vulnerable but we continue to serve and pray for growth.

- Women's Fellowship meeting is conducted every 1st Saturday of the month with prayer and reflection.
- Cottage Prayer meeting including biblical

- reflection takes place every last Saturday of the month in people's home
- Fasting prayer is conducted every second Saturday of the month creating opportunity to seek God's favour for various needs.
- Lenten meditation takes place every year, which continues to be a great time for reflection on the cross of Jesus, self-examination and spiritual renewal.

#### **HENLEY & GRANGE**

Over the last three years we have been working towards our vision to be 'a church for all ages', a vision which commits us to reaching out to families and younger people, while continuing to nurture and care for our older members.

After a review process last year, in which we considered how best to structure our Sunday services to fulfil this vision, we began new services in February this year, with our first service at 8.30am designed to meet the needs of those who are nurtured by traditional service, while our second service at 10am is a blend of traditional and contemporary, with a view to engaging with families and younger people.

A key part of our plan for the 10am 'All Ages Service' was to employ a Children's and Families Minister to work one day a week preparing and leading the Sunday children's ministry, and one day per week in an outreach focussed role. Melissa Irving commenced in this position in late March and has worked as a volunteer at Fulham North Primary school, alongside the Pastoral Care Worker, making connections with students. Melissa is currently in the planning stage for a new Playgroup to commence in fourth term this year with a view to connecting with families in our local area.

Over the course of this year, the Parish has been starting up "Neighbourhood Circles" connecting parishioners who live in the same neighbourhood or suburb, with a view to building networks of care between them, so that such care can then also be extended to people who are not currently church attenders. We are doing this in response to Christ's command to "love your neighbour". Our prayer as a parish is that God will continue to renew us spiritually, so that we can be a blessing to the people around us and share with them the good news about Jesus in our actions and words.

# KIDMAN PARK & MILE END

We are continuing with our regular worships ministries—Op Shop, Craft, and Settler's English Class. Last year, we were able to start one more Bible study group and it is going well. Our ministry with mentally ill people is going slowly, sometimes having some of them attending our church, but other times none. Our involvement with Regis Aged Care continues, but ministry with local schools have been reduced to almost nothing. We have seen some people walking into church and we hope that more of them will stay in church and be faithful members of the parish. Korean ministry is not taking place yet, but we are still hoping that it will happen in near future.

#### LARGS BAY

In God's grace we have had a great year and we have some great specific things for us to celebrate—along with celebrating God's faithful love to us in Christ. A particular highlight was a new collaborative initiative that the Parish did with Anglicare, an initiative named "Cans in a Van". This was a Christmas food drive advertised across the entire community and with gratitude we received donations from 'all' parts of the community—much more that we anticipated. We were thankful for Anglicare partnership whose tangible support encouraged us to have a go, and have enough resources to advertise, collect and distribute.

In our general life together it's hard to calculate the amount of food and drink we have consumed together, and time spent with each other sharing how Jesus is good news: though I suspect that those figures are more important

than some of the other ones that capture us. In the year we've had funerals, baptisms and births! We have loved, listened, read, sung, and camped together, which all strengthens us as a community. At times we have even frustrated each other, yet because we are shared recipients of unmerited grace in Jesus, we are a strong united body in him—that's the good news of the gospel that we have sought to receive and share practically with each other.

After much prayer, discernment, discussion, commitment, and trust in God, St Richard's developed and launched our Mission Action Plan. We feel that it is important to have a clear mission and purpose. Our MAP connects to the Diocesan Vision 2022 and enables the parish to understand that we are part of a bigger picture. The MAP turned out to be a wonderful celebration of our parish life and activities beyond the parish.

We continue to thank God for the beautiful relationship we have with the Emmanuel Tamil Church community under the leadership of Rev'd Samson Asirvatham and Rev'd Dr Gethzi Devasagayam. We have enjoyed sharing worship opportunities together, including our Patronal

Festivals and Christmas services followed by a meal. Our children's and youth leader has presented children's talks at their service and will assist in an outreach program in October.

With great joy our children's ministry continues to thrive. All ministries to children and youth at St Richard's are scripture-driven and immersed in prayer. Our steady growth through the graciousness of the Holy Spirit has required that we remain flexible and adaptable at all times, catering to the differing needs and abilities of children. We produce a newsletter keeping families up to date on any developments. We have developed several different age-appropriate programs, including: Tweenies- for toddlers and pre-school aged children; SCUBA (Seeking Christ through Understanding, Believing and Action) - for primary school children; and Youth Connect for years 6, 7 and secondary. We continue to encourage participation of children and youth within the service.

Some highlights were our Patronal Festival which was celebrated with Bishop Chris Mc-Leod and Susan McLeod. We welcomed fabulous guest speakers for example: the Rev'd Paula Bullock from Anglicare SA and Megan Schwarz from the Anglican Board of Mission.

St Richard's continues our strong focus on mission and engagement within the local community through our Trading Post, Book Post, hall hire and connection with Lockleys Primary School. Our Socks and Jocks drive for Anglicare Sunday was once again highly successful. St Richard's was awarded the 1079 LIFE FM Heart for Adelaide Award, and Jodie and Peter from LIFE FM presented the award to the parish in July. A number of people attended the event from our parish and the wider community. The

sanctuary was full of socks, jocks, underwear for women and children, beanies, scarves and gloves. Listeners from 1079 LIFE FM also generously donated to the event.

We look forward to where the Holy Spirit leads us as we continue to share the gospel in this flourishing community as we encourage more to grow in discipleship of Jesus.

#### PORT ADELAIDE

The church of St Paul in Port Adelaide has a superb location. It is built literally in the middle of Church Place, with the traffic going by on either side. It faces St Vincent Street, the main East-West thoroughfare, while anyone coming over the Birkenhead Bridge from the North will see the church immediately in front of them. You can't miss it. St Paul's has been at the heart of the Port since 1841. Since the "new" church was built in 1905 it has seen great changes. The railway has come and gone and the port itself has grown to a crowded commercial centre and shrunk again to a sleepy heritage precinct, with many of its old buildings empty or demolished to make way for car parks. Many attempts have been made to revitalise the Port, to varying degrees of success. The Anglican Church in Port Adelaide is still there, faithfully worshipping God and serving the people of the area. There are baptisms and confirmations, festivals and celebrations, community events and all the signs of a living church. Someone has said, "The past is history, the future's a mystery, the present is a gift." May the people of St Paul's accept the gift gratefully and use it faithfully and give thanks to God.

#### **SEMAPHORE**

During 2019 St Bede's celebrates 140 years of worship and service on this site at the centre of Semaphore. Many generations of people have worshipped, been baptised and confirmed, sung in the choir, married and were buried at St Bede's. People were invited to come back to St Bede's to celebrate our Patronal Festival with us on May 26th . As we celebrate our past, we value the present and pray for the future.

In our Mission Action Planning in February we recognised four important compass points: Worship, Nurturing Faith, Engaging Community and Service and Stewardship.

Worship at St Bede's during the last year has included Pet Blessing, Anniversary of Armistice Proclamation, Anglicare Sunday, Epiphany Chalking, Harvest Festival and the introduction of a monthly midweek reflective evening service. We committed to reading of Luke's Gospel during Lent to nurture our faith. Our engagement with the wider community has been enhanced by moving Bede's Bazaar from Semaphore Road into the church hall. The St Bede's with Anglicare Drop-in-Centre is blessed with an amazing group of volunteers that provide breakfast and company to 30 to 40 people each Tuesday and Wednesday morning in a safe and welcoming space. We are careful in our stewardship of a historic church, well-utilized hall and interesting grounds, which include a thriving community garden with a butterfly garden project as part of a "bringing back the butterflies."

#### WOODVILLE

Appropriately enough, since the Parish Priest at Woodville is also the National Anglican Bishop for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, a number of events this year are associated with our connection to the local aboriginal community.

The Yellaka Dancers, an indigenous group, meet for practice in our Parish Hall. They featured in a Sound and Light presentation on the banks of the River Torrens at the most recent Festival of Arts. They also feature at our Annual St Margaret's Day celebrations, and this year they were present and contributed significantly at the blessing of a feature rock, which has been placed near the entry to the church. This rock will be more formally inaugurated on St Margaret's Day later this year, hopefully in the presence of local dignitaries. The Dancers also made a trip to Shanghai on a cultural exchange programme. When the parish learned that they were also to make a visit to the Solomon Islands at their own expense, a quick whip around resulted in them being presented with a cheque for \$500 to help with their expenses.

In preparation for the St Margaret's Day event, the gardens at the front of the church have been completely replanted with a mixture of local and traditional plantings, reflecting the shared history of this part of Adelaide.

The Tamil congregation, formerly at Alberton, has moved to St Richard's at Lockleys. However, Fr Samson Asirvatham remains associated with the Parish of Woodville. He assists with services in Nursing Homes and occasionally takes a turn at preaching at St Margaret's. The parish has the benefit of hearing not only from him, but also from our parish priest, Bishop Chris McLeod, Archdeacon Conrad Patterson and Bro Wayne Philp, tssf. It makes for a varied diet. We are also blessed with no less than five regular organists. Two Sundays a month we enjoy the contribu-

tion of Mrs Barbara Ives, one Sunday we have Dr Anthony Rogers, and one Sunday a month it is Roger Pryor. On the occasions when none of these is available we have the services of Christine Barber. The St Margaret's All-Stars feature on the occasional fifth Sunday.

The parish has an active women's group, LEGS (The Ladies' Evening Group) in the summer and WAGS (The Women's Afternoon Group) in the winter. Their activities cover a wide range. There is also a regular monthly Wednesday afternoon programme which brings together guests from Ian George Court and those parishioners not normally able to come to Sunday services. For them the afternoon begins with a short Communion Service which they very much enjoy.

It was with great enthusiasm that we listened to our Archbishop's Vision 2022 and we took the challenge seriously. Therefore, this year of 2019 has been a time of hope and great change for us as we look to forwarding our mission and outreach and the best use of our talents and money.

Our premises in Leigh Street were in an excellent position for our members to visit. However, as our membership is advancing in age and decreasing in numbers, the visits to the centre were decreasing rapidly. As the rent for the premises was considerable, we asked the Diocese if they could possibly find alternate accommodation for us. This was accomplished and we now have a small office in the St Barnabas building with considerably reduced rental costs. We will now have more funds available for distribution to our chosen mission and outreach programmes.

This year, we will be supporting the Anglicare Foster Care programme as well as continuing our other mission and outreach programmes - the Overseas Peace and Reconciliation Process in Africa, Training Fund for Indigenous Women in the Northern Territory, the Australian Disaster Relief Fund and funds to Mary Sumner House in London where these are distributed to various third world countries to aid many projects. We also support students at St Barnabas College.

As well as those monetary donations, members in their own parishes and branches support The Quickest Warmth Project in more practical ways, providing toiletries, clothing and household goods and much more. We continue babysitting duties at the Helen Mayo House, volunteer at Breakfast Clubs and Meals-on-Wheels and work in our own parishes and communities.

For some years past we have supported financially the St John's Youth Services but as our main project currently is with Anglicare, we now support St John's by renting meeting rooms in their say.kitchen in Currie Street. Our members support their kitchen by purchasing food and drinks made by the student chefs they are training – we encourage all Anglicans to support the say.kitchen for good food and excellent service.

Mothers' Union in this Diocese is taking our new logo, MULOA, seriously. We are Listening

to the needs of those less fortunate than ourselves, Observing where and how we can be of support and Acting in the ways noted above.

### Housing and Homelessness

Affordable, safe and secure housing with the

appropriate support services is key to addressing homelessness. We are buoyed by the early successes of the Adelaide Zero Project that I co-chair and of which we are an active member. Research co-funded by AnglicareSA and conducted by the UniSA School of Business shows we are on the right path. Getting to know those rough sleeping in the CBD by name and gaining an understanding of what led them there has allowed an individualised approach. Through the project, 160 people have been housed in just over a year. There is still much to do.

Government investment in affordable and social housing is crucial. We have a serious shortfall in the supply of housing and existing houses need rejuvenation. AnglicareSA has a robust 10-year investment plan to develop and upgrade safe, secure, well-located and affordable social housing.

# Children and young people

AnglicareSA has partnered with the SA Government to deliver our Safe Kids, Families Together pilot program, focussed on early intervention to keep children safely at home with their families. Where that is not possible, we need to ensure there are sufficient foster carers in the system to provide vulnerable children and young people with love and support. As SA's largest foster care provider, we see the huge and growing demand for foster carers and we continue to campaign to attract a diverse range of carers.

### Aged care

Over the past year, Australians have become increasingly aware that older people, as some of the most vulnerable in our society, are being treated very badly. Disturbing anecdotes of elder abuse in our country's aged care facilities has led to a Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety. AnglicareSA strongly wel-

comed the Royal Commission. We need greater accountability and transparency in this rapidly growing industry.

We continue to invest in expanding and improving our Aged Care Services. In December 2018, we opened a new community services hub adjacent to the Elizabeth City Centre, which is home to Allied Health and Home Care services among others. Major refurbishments of resident rooms, outdoor areas and communal spaces are now complete at AnglicareSA's Elizabeth Dutton Court and Elizabeth East residential aged care sites.

# Disability and mental health

Another area of vulnerability in our community that requires focus is disability and mental health. The NDIS has been good, but is a long way from perfect. Unfortunately, the changes to the way programs are funded under the NDIS has meant changes to our workforce structure to enable us to fully and effectively transition to the NDIS. AnglicareSA continues to advocate for funding and services for those not eligible for the NDIS, particularly those with mental health needs.

### Senior Chaplain Bishop Greg Thompson

AnglicareSA is pleased to have been able to fund the new position of Senior Chaplain to provide leadership and support to the Health and Welfare Chaplains and the AnglicareSA Chaplains.

#### Looking forward

AnglicareSA is well positioned to continue its significant positive impact on the lives of many. Key to our success is ensuring we have the right people working in the right places. We are focussed on supporting and developing our existing workforce while attracting and retaining more talented staff.

We continue to nurture and value our connection with the Anglican community in a variety of ways. We acknowledge with gratitude the generosity of many parishes and Anglican schools that support our unfunded programs, enabling us to offer much needed emergency assistance and other innovative services to those in need.

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#### 1. The Trust

Leigh Trust was incorporated by an Act of the South Australian Parliament assented to on 4 December 1929.

The Trust was formed with the vesting of a number of properties and in particular, two Town Acres numbered 76 and 111 in the City of Adelaide, which properties were originally donated pursuant to a certain Indenture made 6 April 1840 between William Leigh of Little Aston Hall near Litchfield in the County of Stafford in England and the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts incorporated by the Charter of His Late Majesty King William the Third.

The purpose of the original donation was then and is now principally for maintenance and support of clergy, the building and maintenance of Churches, Schools, Halls and Rectories of the Anglican Church of Australia in South Australia.

In 1996 as the result of a sustained recession in South Australia evidenced by significant falls in the value of city properties, increasing vacancies in secondary commercial buildings and in many instances whole buildings remaining empty, the ability of Leigh Trust to continue to provide growth in grants was not possible and in fact grants were then budgeted to drop by one third from 1 January 1997.

During that year, the Trust had a Strategic Plan prepared by J L W Advisory, and as a result, in August 1997, the Trust sold the ten properties, which it owned in Leigh Street, Adelaide. The net proceeds from this sale, after discharging bank borrowings, have been progressively roinvested into various types of listed shares, trusts and other securities to generate income from which grants continue to be paid.

Since then, the remaining properties in Pulteney Street, Adelaide, the Barossa and Jeffcott Street, North Adelaide have been sold. One small holding has been retained – a block of land in Cockburn, listed as an asset under "Land and Buildings".

Grants are made to the three Dioceses of the Province of South Australia, being Adelaide, Willochra and The Murray, for the more effective work of the Anglican Church in South Australia.

# 3 Trustees' Report

#### 3.1 Statement of Policy

The long term strategy of the Trustees of the Leigh Trust is to provide the Dioceses of the Province of South Australia with a steady and consistent growth in grants from income earned from its net assets.

The Trust holds a diversified asset base of Australian shares so as to achieve a spreading of risk with the long term aim of increasing, over time, not only the Trust's capital, but also net income and ultimately grants payable to beneficiaries. The Trust has been progressively purchasing shares in listed public companies, units in listed property trusts, convertible notes and other income earning securities pursuant to an investment strategy prepared originally by J B Were and now monitored by Macquarie Private Wealth. Their advice is considered at regular meetings of the Trustees.

Trustees regularly review the Trust's long-term strategies, investment rules and operating performance, with an extensive review of all, conducted in early 2017.

The contract arrangements for its financial advisor, Macquarie Private Wealth Management were also reviewed during the report year, following a trade call for the provision of financial advice services in 2016.

Macquarie Private Wealth Management's current three contract is due for renewal in June 2019, being in the 2019/20 year.

Pursuant to this strategy, investments are made as market conditions and portfolio balancing dictate.

#### 3.2 Financial Performance

The Trust's earning income is derived from its listed investments and cash on deposit. Where total earning income increased by \$996,017 from \$1,329,036 in 2018 to \$2,325,054 in 2019, there was a loss on sale of investments of \$126,912 in 2019 to a gain of \$325,613 in 2018. (Ref 3.2.3.)

The total expenditure including grants of \$1,028,400 increased by \$40,576 from \$1,040,931 to \$1,068,955. The majority of the increase being related to the grants of \$30,000.

#### 3.2.2 Operating Surplus

The operating surplus increased by \$997,993 during the year from \$1,286,505 in the 2017/2018 year to \$2,284,499 in 2018/2019 This was primarily due to increase in franked dividend income from two Buy Backs during the year totalling \$533,587, and the change of the investment structure.

#### 3.2.3 Capital Loss

During the year, net capital losses totalling \$126,912 were as a result of gains from the sale of various investments being offset against losses from two Buy Backs (Rio Tinto and BHP) where total proceeds on sale constituted 6.5% of total funds received, while the remainder being Fully Franked Dividends.

Pursuant to the established policy, the balance was transferred to the Asset Realisation Reserve.

#### 3.2.4 Grants

Regular grants to the three Dioceses in South Australia were increased by approximately 3% from the previous year. The grants paid were as follows:

In determining the level of grants to be paid in the following year, Trustees budget an operating surplus, and after setting aside twenty percent of that surplus for addition to Trust Capital, allocate a significant proportion of the balance for payment of regular grants.

In the twelve months prior to 31 March 2019, the total Trust Funds book value increased by \$1,129,186 compared to an increase of \$613,779 in the same period to 31 March 2018.

#### 3.3 General Overview and Outlook

In developing the budget for the year ending 31 March 2020, Trustees continue to have regard to the need to sustain and grow the Trust's assets over the long term, with the aim of achieving increasing grants year on year.

The income this year exceeded budget by \$1,006,768 mainly from the Fully Franked Dividends from the Buy Backs and also the change in investments structure.

Trustees continue to pursue a conservative long term budget policy.

#### 3.4 Investment Committee

To effectively administer the Trust's portfolio of investments, Trustees continue with an Investment Committee which meets on a regular basis with the Secretary and a representative of Macquarie Private Wealth.

#### 1 STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report is prepared to satisfy the reporting obligations of the trustees.

The trustees have determined that the trust is not a reporting entity and that this will be a special purpose financial report.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the following Australian Accounting Standards:

#### AASB1031:Materiality

AASB110:Events Occurring After Reporting Date

No other Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group, Consensus Views or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial report is also prepared on an accruals basis, is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

#### Non-current assets

As at 31 March 2019 land is carried at the valuer general's valuation as at 1 January 2000. The same valuation was relevant for 31 March 2019.

Listed investments are carried at cost after making allowance for any permanent impairment in value. The Trust is a long term investor and the Trustees do not necessarily accept that current traded market values evidence a permanent impairment in value.

#### Income Tax

The Trust is income tax exempt pursuant to subdivision 50-B of the income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

#### Revenue

Dividend revenue together with the associated franking rebates is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

#### Disposal of Shares

Receipts on disposal of shares together with related franking rebates are treated as proceeds of disposal although an element of the transaction takes the form of a franked dividend.

#### Goods and Service Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense.





### ANGLICAN SCHOOLS

#### LIAISON OFFICER'S MESSAGE

# Mark Porter Schools Liaison Officer

The combined enrolment of the 10 Anglican schools in the Diocese was 11 093 students at the February Census.

During the year, work progressed on several matters of long-standing interest to schools.

The Anglican Schools Networking Group (ASNG), a committee of deputies and subschool heads, continued to promote student leadership by arranging a successful workshop for Middle and Senior School students at Walford in August. They also arranged meetings to promote the professional development of teachers. Especially noteworthy among the ASNG's initiatives are the hub groups (e.g. the Special Education Hub) which enable like-minded professionals to gather and share ideas and experiences to improve school programs. In February ASNG agreed to convene a new group for emerging leaders in Anglican schools to help them broaden their professional network in a social, collegial setting.

The Chaplains arranged a Workshop for students at the Cathedral in May. Representatives from schools across the Province took part in a round of activities before coming together for worship. For many students, this was their first visit to the Cathedral, and it was delightful to see them occupy the pews and to hear their voices echo throughout the building. The Chaplains also arranged a Confirmation Camp in Term IV which was well attended.

A Working Party continued to investigate the feasibility of offering a Master's degree to emerging leaders in Anglican schools. The choice lies between building on an existing course at St Barnabas College and exploring a possible partnership with another other college or university to develop a unique course with Christian Theology and Anglican Studies as either core units or prerequisites. The Provincial Education Trust agreed to fund two scholarships to enable suitable candidates to undertake the course once it is launched.

The Board also agreed to hold a Planning Day late in 2019 to review its Deed and determine whether other initiatives were worthy of funding. Careful stewardship of the finances has left the Trust with sufficient annual income to sponsor a wide range of activities of practical benefit to both students and staff.

Many schools have historical links with parishes. While faithful Anglicans may lament the loss of "parochial" schools which were once a feature of education provision in South Australia, good news stories about ongoing cooperation between parishes and schools continue to be emerge. One example is the St Francis Bursary. For the past five years, the parish of St Francis Edwardstown has awarded a bursary to a student in an Anglican school enabling him or her to take part in an approved, otherwise unaffordable, outreach activity. Students have used the bursary locally but also overseas in community projects in the Philippines.

Finally, the Heads Forum, a quarterly meeting of Anglican school principals, reviewed its aims. It has always been a collegial group and, for this reason, it is well placed to contribute to the ongoing nation-wide debate about the identity of Anglican schools in Australia.

# No report received



### PEDARE CHRISTIAN COLLEGE

My last report to Synod in 2017 reflected the Board's decision to become One College on One Campus from the start of the 2019 academic year.

The theme for this year's Synod, united and connected, fits perfectly with the significant endeavour that the Pedare community has undertaken over the last three years. On the first day of school in early February this year we officially became united and connected as One College when we welcomed all 320 Reception to Year 5 students to their new learning spaces at our main campus.

The new 'One College' now caters for all 938 students from Reception Ready to Year 12 with room to expand and grow further in the coming years. This has been an exciting time for the community as the realisation of the design and planning of new learning spaces has come to fruition. Such a significant move takes vision, strategic clarity and community strength. The students, parents, staff leadership team and College Board have come together with the commitment that the learning opportunities for

the students are enhanced by all being on the same campus.

The new STEM (Science Technology Engineering Mathematics)-enabled learning spaces for robotics, media studies, aquaponics and micro-farming provide opportunities for shared and differentiated learning, and give students the chance to explore, hypothesise, gather data, design, prototype, problem solve, redesign and build the final products.

The benefits of bringing our community together physically have been profound for the soul of our faith-based College. The older students have embraced the opportunity to support and care for the younger students in an authentic way. This is no better exemplified than by our Year 12 students who are buddied with the new Reception students for shared learning and enrichment activities. Such connections are now possible across many year levels and build an important sense of belonging for students.

Worship and the Christian Life programs define us as an Anglican and Uniting Church School. Worship is shared in an educative, invitational manner and students learn about faith and the spiritual dimension of their life. We are a diverse community with students from Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist, Sikh and Jewish faith backgrounds. The life and teachings of Jesus provide all within the community an understanding of how the Christian values and those of the other faiths are similar. Jesus' teachings of tolerance, understanding, reaching out to the disillusioned and maligned, and the need for service to others, are embraced, and build our community's strength and connection. We want Pedare students to feel a strong sense of belonging and connection though their faith and the educational experiences they encounter at school.



### PULTENEY GRAMMAR SCHOOL

#### Enrolment

Pulteney opened the year with an enrolment of 870 students (Reception to Year 12), with an additional 109 in the Early Learning Centre.

#### Mission

Pulteney is a dynamic, inclusive city school community that inspires, challenges and empowers for tomorrow.

We inspire our students with a love of learning which empowers them to challenge the way they think and allows them to develop their individual talents and passions, both for the good of themselves and others.

We take a holistic approach to education and challenge our students to fulfil their potential and gain success by participating in a broad range of personalised, rich and diverse experiences.

We build confidence and creativity by challenging students to contribute and take risks within a caring, supportive framework.

We instil in our students a strong sense of community and citizenship through our pastoral care system. This forges strong relationships between students and staff and results in students connecting across year levels.

We challenge intellectual, aesthetic and moral curiosity through inquiry-based teaching and learning. We develop physical and social capabilities in learning contexts, leading to skill acquisition. We challenge students to reflect on life's deeper meanings.

Our focus is to empower our students to become well rounded citizens with a strong ethical and moral character who are capable of assuming a leadership role in the local and global community.

# Ministry and Worship – Invitational and Interactive

Our approach to worship is invitational and interactive. It acknowledges and respects the pluralistic society in which we live and is an essential part of belonging to our community.

The day begins with a form of Morning Prayer appropriate for the year level. Students also take part in weekly services in St Augustine's Chapel, including the Eucharist at different times during the year.

This year we farewelled one faithful, devoted Chaplain, the Rev'd Michael Lane, and welcomed another, the Rev'd Tracey Gracey.

#### Service - Our Faith in Action

Service Learning is integrated in everyday school life, providing students with rich and challenging experiences for personal growth and for gaining a deeper knowledge and understanding of other cultures.

Pulteney continues its long-established relationship with AnglicareSA (especially the Magdalene Centre), the Salvation Army, The Jodi Lee Foundation, ABM, CMS, the Cancer Council, Legacy, the World's Greatest Shave, Bandanna Day, and Harmony Day.

Recent highlights have been our work with St Vincent de Paul (the Men's Shelter in Carrington Street) and service journeys to Nepal. Our relationship with Nepal extends over many years, initially focusing on outreach to an orphanage and the Blue Sky School.

Pastoral Care – Building an Understanding of "Self" and "Other"

Pastoral Care and Wellbeing are overseen by our Head of Student Wellbeing who works closely with senior and middle managers, specialists, clinicians and the Chaplain.

The weekly timetable gives all year levels access to pastoral care and the Wellbeing Program. Seminars and workshops, including guest speakers, are programmed to help meet the developmental needs of students throughout the year.

# Part of An Anglican Community – United and Connected

Pulteney values its relationship with other Anglican Schools in South Australia and the Diocese of Adelaide. Our leaders welcome the opportunities to interact with their peers in other schools to share practice, network and explore the various dimensions of what it means to work in and belong to an Anglican School.

### History

St Andrew's School was established by St Andrew's Church to provide an education for the children of Walkerville, teaching the principles of the Anglican Church. The original sandstone building opened on 18 September 1850.

In 1978, the School was gifted by St Andrew's Church to the body known as St Andrew's School Incorporated.

Throughout its history, St Andrew's has been uncompromisingly committed to the pursuit of excellence in teaching and learning, and in the creation of a safe and nurturing family environment.

Ties of tradition and affection have been maintained over the years, with the School and Church continuing to work in close harmony.

#### Walkerville Art Show

St Andrew's School proudly supports this important community arts event. The Walker-ville Art Show envisages a vibrant local culture, inspired by diversity and inclusivity, ideals which align with St Andrew's values. The Arts is one of our key learning areas.

# South Australian Living Arts Festival

The SALA event with the Walkerville Council and community artist, Koruna Schmidt Mumm,

was a great success.

Year 7 students enjoyed a full-day workshop exploring the local cemetery and creating lanterns in memory of the children buried there. These were displayed in the arbour and formed a major part of the ephemeral installation launched by the Deputy Mayor which was open to the public.

# 22Too Partnership

In 2018 St Andrew's launched a partnership arrangement with 22Too who use the facilities to conduct co-curricular type programs (gymnastics, dance and birthday parties), mainly after hours.

Their programs complement St Andrew's and draw members of the wider community and potential enrolments to the School.

# Christian Education Program, Ministry, Worship and Service

Worship is an integral part of community life at St Andrew's. It occurs weekly for students in Years 3 to 7 and twice a term for students in Reception to Year 2. The students are involved in preparing, leading and serving at worship.

Students in the Early Learning Centre also enjoy a number of visits to the Church to hear bible stories, ask questions and sing songs.

Through the sacramental program, students in Years 3 to 7 have the opportunity to be baptised and admitted to Holy Communion.



#### ST COLOMBA COLLEGE

### School

St Columba is an R-12 Anglican and Catholic school serving the needs of young people in the north of Adelaide. Established in 1997 as a joint initiative of the Anglican and Catholic churches of the Adelaide Dioceses the College is open to families who are seeking a Christian education founded upon the beliefs, values and practices of both traditions of our unique ecumenical partnership.

We are a Christ-centred community and foster a culture that reflects the values of the Gospel: welcome, inclusion, respect, compassion, reconciliation and forgiveness from which comes peace and hope.

Academic ability and success for all students are important. Our approach develops the whole person and fosters each individual's spirituality, social, emotional and physical needs. We are a proud multicultural and diverse community where each person is valued, respected and accepted.

Staff, as the face of Christ, are optimistic and hopeful, and believe in every child. We are dedicated to helping every child achieve their best and provide extraordinary care. Relationships are at the heart of who we are, and the College plays a vital role in helping young people build

lives that have meaning and purpose. We want our students to aim high and to make a positive difference to society now and in the future.

#### Faith in Action

The Anglican and Catholic nature of St Columba enables students to engage in rich and diverse experiences of prayer and worship and to experience both Anglican and Catholic rites and rituals. The College has strong links with the Anglican Holy Cross Parish, Elizabeth, and the Catholic Parish based at St Thomas More Church.

Students experience Christian education across the curriculum, but specifically through a formal, designated Religious Education curriculum which incorporates elements of both the Anglican RAVE program as well as the Crossways Curriculum developed by Catholic Education SA.

Seasonal celebrations occur according to the liturgical calendar. In addition to daily prayer in classrooms and staff rooms, school and House assemblies have prayer and worship as a gathering focus.

The College Chaplain, the Rev'd Jo Smith, works with the Directors of Spirituality, Ms Jane Bailey (R-5) and Miss Eugenia Stopyra (6-12), to build a community of students, staff and families united in prayer and worship. Rev'd Jo develops and leads liturgical celebrations and spiritual retreats, provides spiritual and pastoral support for individuals and families, and fosters links with local parishes and Anglicare. Fr Pat Woods (Elizabeth Catholic Parish) celebrates the Eucharist regularly with the Junior School and with House Teams in the Middle and Senior School.

The Rev'd David Amol, the Family Liaison Officer, nurtures a welcoming and inclusive community, while Social Workers Mwajemi Hussein and Kim Nefyn support mothers from refugee backgrounds. Phillip Matthews undertakes a chaplaincy role in the Junior School, while Susan Warrior coordinates the learning and pastoral support for our Indigenous and Torres Strait Islander students.

The Community Development Officer, Shelley Enders, works with students and families to increase our College interaction and engagement with the local community, parishes and families.

Christian service and social justice are integral to our community. All students belong to one of eight College Houses named after four prominent Australian Anglican and Catholic 'patrons'. House activities are conducted to support local and international Anglican and Catholic charities.

Finally, student action teams lead various initiatives in cultural awareness, social justice, environment and wellbeing (e.g. fundraising activities for Anglicare, ABM, Caritas and the St Vincent de Paul Society).



# WALFORD ANGLICAN SCHOOL FOR GIRLS

The shocking, tragic events in Christchurch this year remind us of the importance of a united, connected community.

Our world can be a complicated, confusing place and helping young people make sense of it can

be challenging. At Walford Anglican School for Girls showing how loving kindness, compassion and hope can outweigh destruction remains our imperative.

As authors Robert Putnam (Bowling Alone) and Andrew Leigh (Disconnected) comment, many people increasingly today do not know the names of their neighbours; they play fewer sports for the local club, attend church infrequently and are often too busy to give blood or attend after work local community meetings. And yet it is proven that our neighbourhoods, communities and friends play a vital role in improving civic engagement, our relationships and our sense of wellbeing.

At the heart of Walford's mission to empower young women to participate with confidence, courage and compassion in our global world through an inspired education is a caring and connected community.

### The House System

The school has a well-established House system, with each student and staff member allocated to one of five Houses: Cleland, Fletcher, Gordon, Murray or Prince/ Rayner. The Houses provide the students with a sense of belonging, while encouraging friendly competition throughout a range of sporting and other activities. The House system strengthens the connection between the Junior, Middle and Senior Schools. This structure provides the basis for a coherent pastoral care program, as well as opportunities for House-based community service activities.

### Peer Leaders Program

Every girl in Years 6, 7 and new Year 8 and 9s has a Peer Leader who is her mentor and friend. Year 11 students elected as peer leaders apply for the positions and are specially trained to mentor and support the younger girls. A similar program is replicated in the Junior School, with Year 5 girls talking on leadership and mentoring roles for small groups of younger Junior School girls.

# Co-Curricular Program

While learning is at the heart of our daily program, the co-curricular program is an integral part of the broad educational experience offered at Walford. All students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular activities, either individually or as part of a group. Girls are free to choose from a range of activities and experiences in the areas of sports, the arts and cultural pursuits, enterprise and innovation, problem solving and personal development.

# **Community Service**

In keeping with the Christian ethos of the school and the International Baccalaureate Diploma requirement of Creativity, Community and Service, students have been involved in many community service activities and have supported a wide range of organisations such as the Lenten Appeal, Magdalene Drop In Centre, Student2Student Program, the Smith Family, Kickstart for Kids and Salvation Army.

Students have just returned from Nepal, the site of our community service cultural immersion program where they experience life in a developing country.

We have a number of active groups in the School, including the Parent Teacher Association (PTA), the Blue and Gold Committee, the Grandparents Club, the Rowing Parent Group and the Old Scholars' Association.

# THE AUSTRALIAN FELLOWSHIP OF EVANGELICAL STUDENTS

AFES is an inter-denominational mission organization which works in partnership with local churches to equip Christian tertiary students to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ on campus. It was first established in 1934 at Adelaide University and there are partner groups on all campuses in South Australia. Today, there are

both Anglican and Baptist Chaplains who work in partnership with this important ministry.

In 2019 we have seen God powerfully at work in the lives of young people, drawing many to faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, and preparing many more young believers for a lifetime of Christian service.

Some highlights include our 5-day Mid-Year Conference attended by over 120 students on the topic of "Worship", a growing outreach to international students, and our week of heightened evangelism known as "Jesus Week" featuring outreach talks and debates on the topics of "I find hope in ... pursuing happiness/sex and relationships/discovering myself/what happens next". We have also run the "Mark Drama" as a powerful and creative way of introducing students to Jesus.

We've been privileged to see university students become disciples of the Lord Jesus and we would ask you to please continue to pray for this strategic ministry which seeks to evangelize unbelievers and enable Christian students to navigate their way through the various philosophical, intellectual and life challenges which growing independence brings.

#### EXECUTIVE OFFICER

South Australian Council of Churches remains committed to Receptive Ecumenism, where we grow in our covenanting as the people of God, and work towards our understanding of being one in the unity of Christ. SACC has continued to connect with, and facilitate, ecumenical partnerships throughout 2018-2019. This is a transitioning time for not only SACC, but for many of our church communities. With deep respect and friendship for our companions on these journeys, SACC has adopted two key approaches in our pilgrimage through these changes.

#### Consultation

A significant consultation process has been occurring throughout 2018 – 2019, to understand the direction and focus of our ecumenical covenanting together. It has involved conversations within General Council, SACC Committees and within local communities. These conversations will continue across the state into next year, as we listen and engage with our diverse community.

The reflection on being the people of God together, in these changing times, has currently identified a deep yearning for connection with each other, with a greater focus on inter-generational and inter-cultural engagement. Inter-church Councils have identified a tension of supporting CPWs and desiring more opportunities of 'being' churches together. There is a desire for greater ecumenical collaboration and project work on ecological, justice and peace-making initiatives. Chaplaincy remains a key ecumenical engagement, and with the changes in Chaplaincy Services SA, SACC looks towards a greater collaborative engagement in this area. We have heard communities speak about the

complexity of wanting to engage ecumenically, yet also struggling as congregations to maintain their own wellbeing and energy. Being churches together in learning situations, with focused projects or to enjoy hospitality together, have been identified as ways to build relationship, recognise strengths and talents in our different denominations, and offer our gifts into the ecumenical space across our diverse communities.

This process has identified the desire to move from 'a council' towards an 'active' community, acknowledged publicly through a name change and dynamic focus. Churches Together SA, explains who we are (Churches), what we are doing (being Together) and where we are (in SA). Queensland and WA have already adopted this change to 'Churches Together' and its directional focus. The formalising of the SACC name change will be at the Annual General Meeting on October 12th 2019.

# In the Way of Christ

With the release of the collaborative work Receptive Ecumenism – Listening, Learning and Loving in the Way of Christ, ed. Rev Dr Vicky Balabanski and Ms Geraldine Hawkes, SACC have committed to a cycle of: Listening in the Way of Christ; Learning in the Way of Christ; & Loving in the Way of Christ.

In 2019, we began the process of state-wide Listening Circles. During this time of 'drawing the circle wide', where we welcome hearing from local church communities, SACC/CTSA hope to visit in regional areas, so that all who wish to take part, are able to offer their voices into this space. The first Listening Circle was in Burra in July. It was also a joint initiative between SACC and the ecumenical Disaster & Recovery Ministry, enabling those who had to travel in that regional community, a significant weekend

of listening, learning and being together. It was a great success, though highlighted the desire for a longer session together. Further Listening Circles will be planned over the next year.

#### Farewell & Welcome

Ms Geraldine Hawkes retired at the end of January 2019 after nearly 20 years in ecumenical ministry. She is enjoying travelling and spending time with family and friends, she tells me! Rev Anne Hewitt began on January 29th, after many years of involvement in the SA ecumenical circles. She is a UCA minister, who has ministered in the last 10 years in ecumenical and multi-faith settings, as well as growing up with a very ecumenical family and friendship group. It is her great delight to share in this ministry, and she looks to a renewing and flourishing time as Churches Together in SA.

During this year, we have also been farewelling our office space and office equipment! There have been significant difficulties around technical equipment, server, domain, website, and telephones. We are now also having to vacate our office of eleven years at Flinders Street Baptist Church. We will be moving to new premises, we hope, before our October AGM. When funds are available, we also hope to develop a new web and social media presence. The E-news has been refreshed and updated, and it is now reaching over 700 emails weekly. We have received very positive feedback, and look to our ecumenical members to share their news and events with us to continue to grow in our celebration and understanding of each other.

SACC and the Multi-faith Association of South Australia have collaborated together in a new initiative. After the Christ Church and Sri Lankan tragedies this year, there was a significant call for unity and relationship. SACC hosted two of four conversations, to explore the idea of an Interfaith Rapid Response Network. This will enable us as an interfaith community in SA, to respond at times of tragedy, creating a space for peace and solace through Vigils and/ or Memorials. We hope to also acknowledge and celebrate International Day of Peace on September 21st, as a community of peace in this state. In 2019, the theme is Climate Action for Peace. In the morning, there is St Peter's Creation Care Seminar. In the afternoon, there is a shared supper and event Living the Change -faithful choices for a flourishing world at the Baha'i Centre, where we explore with a panel "How to live more gently on Country".

As SACC moves towards Churches Together SA, and the changing focus, new space and emerging ministry opportunities, we are reminded of the 'great clouds of witnesses' who have gone before us, also into uncertain futures. Their wisdom and commitment to traveling in the Way of Christ, also reminds us that Jesus walks with us on our Emmaus journeys, questioning and listening, as we share our concerns, grief and ponderings. He holds us in prayer 'that they may be one'. He calls us to travel over the stormy waters, and step out of our bobbing boat, reaching towards him, into the calm and welcoming space of his friendship.

We invite you to join this ecumenical circle of friends. We thank you for your support this year. May our covenanting together, draw us into a deeper relationship as God's people, so that we grow in faith and in wisdom, as we share the gifts of the Spirit, with grace, in joy, and be bringers of peace.

It has been a great privilege to represent BCA in SANT. I have valued the prayers of the BCA Council, and the Regional Committee together with many of our supporters. It is always a great encouragement to receive emails from supporters, some outside the SANT region, who take time out to let us know they are praying.

This year has been particularly exciting as we celebrate the hundred years since Bush Church Aid was founded. Many individual churches have particularly acknowledged and celebrated BCA ministry this year. Events have included an evening dinner organised by Trinity Church Adelaide and a celebration weekend bash in Ceduna, acknowledging the pioneering work of BCA on the West Coast of SA.

#### Context

The South Australia and the Northern Territory (SANT) office covers the Province of SA, and the Diocese of the NT. It includes 7 field staff locations, 3 within Darwin, 1 at Katherine, another at Coober Pedy and at Roxby Downs in the Diocese of Willochra and a seventh located on Kangaroo Island in the Diocese of Adelaide. There are 4 bishops within the SANT region:

- Bishop Greg Anderson Diocese of the Northern Territory
- Bishop John Stead Bishop of Willochra
- Bishop John Ford Diocese of the Murray (Retired April 2019)
- Archbishop Geoff Smith Diocese of Adelaide

Our office in Adelaide is located at 37 Angas Street in the heart of the city. Our office is open from 10am to 4.30pm Tuesday and Wednesday, although things can be left or picked up from the front reception by prior arrangement.

#### Field Staff

Brad and Joh Henley – have demonstrated their long-term commitment to Kangaroo island and BCA is committed to support their ministry on the Island. The Parish now has two church centres after the Parndana church was closed.

Geoff and Tracey Piggott – left Coober Pedy in April 2018 to take up pastoral care positions in the Kiama Anglican church in NSW. Rev'd Arthur Tanner has taken on a twice per month locum service in the Catacomb Church. We continue to pray and seek a permanent arrangement for ministry in Coober Pedy.

Glen and Beth McDonald arrived in January 2019 to take up the position in the Roxby Downs Community Church. Glen and Beth are excited by the opportunities within the Roxby community, at Olympic Dam and also at Andamooka.

Kristen and Kathryn Slack – have demonstrated their long term commitment to Katherine by purchasing a house in the town. They also welcomed new born Elianah into the family which was a great time for celebration. Through Kristan's regular newspaper column and through the development of relationships in the gospel, the church is growing.

# CHURCH MISSIONARY SOCIETY SA/NT

During the 2018/2019 financial year, CMS SANT continued to support 18 adults and 18 children serving across nine countries in Africa, South-East Asia, East Asia, and South America. All cross-cultural workers have a primary mission focus of either reaching the world's

gospel poor for Christ or equipping Christian leaders for church and society. Of the CMS SANT gospel workers sent to serve cross-culturally, thirteen workers have a mission focus on reaching the world's gospel poor for Christ and five workers are engaged in equipping Christian leaders mainly through student ministry work or lecturing in theological colleges. During the year, CMS SANT also accepted a new (secure) cross-cultural worker to work among the Buddhist gospel poor in South-East Asia. She finished her training at St Andrew's Hall (the CMS training centre in Melbourne) in June 2019 and is now launching into partnership support work and further training until her departure to location in April 2020. Within 2018/2019, CMS SANT continued to process another seven applications for cross-cultural work for Europe, the Middle-East, and Latin America. We look forward to updating church partners about the progress of these applications in 2019/2020.

The annual CMS Summer Conference was held from January 17–19 2019 with key Bible speaker Rev Dr David Williams (CMS Director of Training) and International Speaker, Dr Peter Thein-Nyunt. CMS Australia was represented by International Director, Rev Peter Rodgers. With over 400 people in attendance, the Summer Conference was a wonderful opportunity to explore the theme Grace for the Lost. At the conference, the Regional Director & Board launched the six strategic priorities that will shape CMS SANT's operations for 2019–2023.

During the financial year, the Branch launched two appeal campaigns. The first was the public campaign for the St Andrew's Hall Redevelopment Project and for the duration of October – March 2019. We are thankful for the financial gifts of over \$90k towards the Redevelopment

Project from South Australia and the Northern Territory. The second campaign was the end of financial year Lasting Hope Appeal where the generous response from current supporters and members of CMS enabled CMS SANT to finish the financial year with a small budget surplus.

#### CITY BIBLE FORUM

# Rev'd Craig Broman

City Bible Forum Adelaide is an interdenominational ministry operating in Adelaide workplaces. It's a nation—wide organization, in every capital city, whose vision is 'to reach the world through the workplace with the good news about Jesus'.

#### We do this by:

- Asking the bigger questions in the public space.
- Empowering Christians to perceive themselves as local missionaries in cross-cultural evangelism.

We wanted to report on two big milestones in the year that helped achieved these goals.

# REFRESH: Asking the bigger questions in the public space.

Cities can be stressful places: bus queues, people glued to their phones, deadlines, dashing between appointments. What if a city could provide some rest in all the madness, just for a few minutes? In March, City Bible Forum, in partnership with local churches, transformed Hindmarsh Square into an oasis with deckchairs, musicians, food trucks, coffee vans and ice-cream. This idea came from a similar event held in the city of Paris 7 years ago.

Over two-days we publicly read through John's gospel over lunch in the autumn sunshine. The goal was to connect to the idea of mindfulness and feeding the soul as well as the body, leaving people refreshed.

This was a courageous attempt to have a positive impact in the public space, trusting that the Word of God is a powerful story that taps deeply into people's longings and achieves the purpose for which it is sent. There was a rich tapestry of 35 story tellers, many of whom learned to tell rather than read their story. They also thoughtfully connected the bible story to their own life story.

Over 620 busy city workers stopped, ate lunch & listened. 22 people took Bible guides including John's gospel and a further 500 made unique visits to the Refresh website. For Christians it was a huge confidence boost, in a world where they feel increasingly shut down. This activity helped many find their voice and it was surprising how curious the public were and how prepared to give the Bible a hearing. It was a winning formula as it was conducted outside the church doors and it was invitational, using the power of story to connect.

It was such a positive experience for both the Christian and the curious. Some Christians mingled with the crowd around the perimeter of Hindmarsh Square, providing bottles of water and a chat. In a great synergy of partnership, Encounter Youth provided invaluable training workshops in interacting with the public as 'jolly minglers.' (Encounter Youth reach out on Hindley St most Saturday nights). Using John's gospel also dovetails with our 1-1 Bible reading strategy and gave many Christians more confidence to invite their work colleagues to give this a go.

We hope to build on this positive venture into the public space in future years.

# OXFORD CENTRE FOR CHRISTIAN APOLOGETICS

Empowering Christians to see themselves as local missionaries

Oxford Centre for Christian Apologetics (OCCA) Summer School, was held at Merton College, Oxford over 7 days in July 2019. It consisted of a rigorous intellectual program unified this year around the theme of Fresh Hope in the face of new challenges. It is run by Ravi Zacharias International Ministries (RZIM) whose tag line is 'Helping the believer think and the thinker believe". 17 Adelaide people from a range of occupations, church backgrounds & stages of life travelled to the other side of the world at their own expense to experience this unique program crafted for lay people.

# Why did they go to Oxford?

 To reflect on key issues percolating at every level of society, extracting principles that reveal the world views undergirding them and then bringing the Bible's grand narrative to bear on them. The presenters modelled how

- to use the terms and language of society over these issues to better convey the good news of the gospel to others. This was an incredibly empowering way to help Christians engage in important issues for our world like Artificial Intelligence, Transgender, Victim culture and Faith in the Public Sphere. It sharpened the Christian's language so that instead of saying to the convinced Darwinian that Christ died for their sins, they talked about the fittest dying for the weakest a clear challenge to the idea of adaptation and survival of the best genes.
- To remember that Christian Faith from its inception was a lay person's movement. This is often overlooked or forgotten. Ordinary people tradespeople, merchants, slaves, public servants, entrepreneurs for the first 300 years effectively spread the good news of Jesus over the known world. This was before we had formalized a professional Christian class: eg: bishops/pastors. OCCA Summer School is designed for the everyday Christian and we kept meeting people from around the world in business, politics, science, economics, medicine and education to name a few. Lay people were actively empowered and inspired to take the good news to their own networks.
- To engage better in debate and discussion rather than shrink from the conversation. To be able to reach people with the gospel, we need more empathy that comes through genuinely curious questions and to slip into their shoes to understand their world view. This did not mean the view could not be challenged but it is essential to understand the person with whom we are talking. Asking powerful questions and respectfully listening is the key to cultivating civil conversations.

- To consider what it means to lead a well lived life. People are often preoccupied with the next goal, challenge, relationship or life-stage and neglect the really important questions of human existence. Who am I? Why am I here? What do I value? What is my legacy? What is an examined life? Often these critical questions are buried under the plea bargain that one day I'll think about them but not now.
- On their return, the Oxford delegates have reported back their insights & tips at the City Bible Forum Celebration Dinner, on 1079Life Radio, church services, at pub dinners after work and one person has even written a research paper.



#### CONVERGE INTERNATIONAL

Converge International (formerly known as ITIM Australia Limited, and the Interchurch Trade and Industry Mission) is an inter-denominational not-for-profit organisation. Since 1960 it has provided pastoral counselling (chaplaincy) and related employee services to workplaces. A member of the Employee Assistance Professionals Association of Australia (EAPAA), Converge International provides workplace services both nationally and internationally. Within Australia, its clients include Commonwealth, State and Local Government, as well as private sector organisations.

# Onsite pastoral counselling (previously 'chaplaincy')

Pastoral Counselling is one of our range of Onsite Services. In South Australia, Converge International provides the service at locations mainly in the metropolitan area, the Adelaide Hills, the Barossa, the Fleurieu and the South East. A typical situation is a government department with its head office in Adelaide and smaller facilities in regional centres.

All our services are available to both employees and family members at the employer's cost. Over the time of the contract, the pastoral counsellors build relationships with the people in each customer organisation they are assigned to. They make regular (typically weekly) workplace visits to 'do the rounds', speaking with employees and providing counselling. They are also available to do home and hospital visits, and attend/conduct funerals. Face-to-face counselling is provided away from the workplace when requested. The counsellor may refer individuals to specialist counselling through the organisation's employee assistance program (EAP) or to a community agency.

There is a 'systemic' aspect to the onsite counselling service, which goes beyond the care of individuals, as the counsellors offer support to the broader organisation and the needs of teams and whole workplaces.

The on-site model of employee support complements the off-site employee assistance program model. The pastoral counsellor monitors morale and reports to management; the counsellor is a familiar face in the workplace and builds trust with employees. Being regularly on site, the counsellor gains an understanding of the culture and the issues confronting employees, and is able

to provide counselling within that context.

In August 2018 Converge launched the Onsite Services Sustain and Development Project. Over four years of workshops and meetings, this four-phase project aims to re-design the Onsite Services product, and implement strategies to establish new customers for the traditional foundational part of the business, namely Onsite Pastoral Counselling. Converge recognises the potential to develop new approaches for workplace support that integrate spiritual care in professional practice.

# Converge International personnel

In South Australia there are currently eight parttime Pastoral Counsellors (chaplains), coming from a range of Christian denominations – some lay ministers, others ordained. All are accredited for the pastoral role, and are endorsed by their local church. Professional support is provided by the national On-site Services Manager through regular phone contact and Quarterly Pastoral Forums. The SA Coordinator also provides peer support.

#### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Welcome to the Third Session of the Forty-Third Synod of the Diocese of Adelaide. We will hear of some of the efforts made towards reconciliation in the course of this Synod.

Given this is the third session of the Synod I expect most of us have been here before. I am conscious though that for at least two people this is their first Synod or their first Synod in their current role. The first of those is the Registrar and Secretary of Synod Amanda Harfield, who began in January this year. In her first ten months Amanda has done a really great job, so we not only welcome you Amanda officially to your first Synod as Registrar and Secretary of Synod, we thank you too. The second person to welcome is the newly minted chancellor Philip Adams. Philip, we welcome you and I especially thank you for agreeing to serve in this way.

Since we last met much has happened in the Diocese and the wider Australian community. This time last year voting was open for the postal ballot concerning a change in the Marriage Act to allow same gender couples to marry in Australia. Seventy-nine point five percent of people eligible to participate in the voluntary ballot did so, and 61.6% voted 'yes' to a change, with 38.4% voting 'no'. Consequently, the Marriage

Act was amended so the definition of marriage is the union between two persons instead of the union between a man and a woman, with the first same gender marriages in Australia occurring in January this year.

In the midst of the public debate on a possible change to the definition of marriage in the Marriage Act, the General Synod of the Anglican church of Australia last September passed a resolution, and I will put it up on the screen. There is quite a lot to the resolution, so it will need to go up in parts.

# The General Synod

- (i) recognises that the doctrine of our church, in line with traditional Christian teaching, is that marriage is an exclusive and lifelong union of a man and a woman, and further,
- (ii) recognises that this has been the subject of several General Synod resolutions over the past fifteen years, and also
- (iii) recognises that the nature of marriage is the subject of ongoing conversation within the church and wider community and that we need to listen to each other with care and respect, and
- (iv) acknowledges the experiences and genuine concerns of LGBTIQ+ people within the church and the community, and therefore
- (v) asks the Doctrine Commission to facilitate a respectful conversation in our church by means of a collection of essays on marriage and samesex relationships that explores Scriptural and theological issues relating to:
- a. The doctrine of marriage expressed in the formularies of the Anglican Church of Australia
- b. Our current Australian context, exploring the relationship between the State's definition of

marriage and the church's doctrine of marriage

- c. Key Old Testament and New Testament texts on sex, marriage and friendship
- d. Scripture and hermeneutics
- e. A theology of blessing
- f. A theology of desire
- g. Godly disagreement on this issue

h. The case for and against same-sex marriage and/or the blessing of same-sex unions.

There are a number of important parts to this resolution. First, it restates what is the doctrine of our church, that marriage is an exclusive and life-long union between a man and a woman. Our marriage liturgies reflect that understanding, and that's why Anglican clergy are not able to officiate at a same gender marriage, nor bless a same gender marriage.

Second, it recognises that the nature of marriage is the subject of ongoing conversation within the church and wider community, and that we need to listen to each other with care and respect, and third, acknowledges the experiences and genuine concerns of LGBTIQ+ people within the church and the community.

That resolution was passed at General Synod well before the ballot was finalised last year, and after the results of the ballot where nearly 80% of voters chose to vote, and nearly two thirds of them voted in favour of a change, it might be said the discussion on marriage in the community is done and dusted. That is not the case in the Anglican Church of Australia. And so, by the resolution the General Synod asks the Doctrine Commission of General Synod to facilitate a collection of essays on various topics related to same gender relationships and the church,

including the blessing of same sex unions. That work has not yet been completed nor has work by the Church Law Commission requested by the Standing Committee of General Synod.

In the meantime, the call in the resolution to listen to each other with care and respect is important and timely. You will know from the business paper that a couple of motions about same gender relationships will be discussed this weekend, and by the nature of the topic those motions may well raise emotions and generate heart felt debate. I ask that as we consider those motions we try very hard to have the debate carefully and respectfully. For us as people who seek to represent God to the wider community the manner in which we make decisions is as important as the decisions themselves.

#### **Royal Commission**

Also last December, the final report of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse was tabled in the federal parliament. One of the recommendations of the Royal Commission was the establishment of an independent redress scheme for survivors of child sexual abuse in institutions. The Federal government accepted that recommendation and a scheme has been established beginning operation on the first of July this year. In order for a claim to be made through the scheme two things have to happen: first, the State needs to pass legislation referring powers to the Commonwealth so that institutions in the state can participate in the scheme, and second, institutions need to sign up to the scheme.

The South Australian government passed its legislation in September and that will come into effect in the first half of next year. The Diocesan Council of this Diocese has resolved to join the

redress scheme, and has resolved to join via the Anglican representative group established by the General Synod. We have no idea how many claims might be made against the Synod, only time will tell, but we remain committed to responding well to survivors of child sexual abuse that happened within our context. Alongside the national redress scheme, the Healing Steps program which has been running in this diocese for some years will continue.

You will have heard in the media that some dioceses in the Australian church have signalled the sale of church property to help pay for redress. At this stage the Diocesan Council has not considered that avenue.

I am conscious that the Prime Minister will be making an apology to survivors, victims and families of those who have suffered child sexual abuse on Monday to coincide with National Children's Week. I am also conscious of criticism by survivors that apologies are not enough. What is required is action. Action to address redress. Action to deal with perpetrators. Action to prevent child sexual abuse from occurring.

In the light of the third call to action we passed without dissent at last year's Synod a number of pieces of General Synod legislation aimed at providing consistent standards and requirements across the church in relation to child safety. The adoption of consistent national standards was another recommendation of the Royal Commission.

One of the standards included in that legislation concerns screening and training. This Diocese has a number of elements to its screening and training regime and these comply with the national standards and state legislation. Each element must be renewed every three years.

Having established standards and policies it is of course vital that they are adhered to. Having policies and not following them does little for the safety of children and vulnerable people and does absolutely nothing to demonstrate that the Church is worthy of community trust when it comes to the safety of children and vulnerable people. I want to thank the people of the Diocese who are taking the safety of children and vulnerable people so seriously, doing the training and undergoing the screening.

I know this involves time and effort and inconvenience, but this absolute attention to training and screening is part of developing and continuing a church culture where the safety of children and vulnerable people is paramount and so is worth our inconvenience. To do so is nothing less than obeying Christ our Lord.

As part of demonstrating our commitment to developing this church culture the legislation we passed last year includes the provision of an independent audit against the screening and training standards we have agreed to, with the results of that audit being published on the General Synod website.

I want to also pay tribute to the staff of the Diocesan office who have worked even harder this year to make sure our records are accurate, and to carry out the processing of safer ministry applications as efficiently as possible with what is a small office team.

#### Vision 2022

Since we last met the vision statement and ministry priorities for the Diocese have been confirmed. Vision 2022 is:

We will be a Diocese of flourishing Anglican Communities, united and connected, whose members are confident and competent to live as disciples of Jesus Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit.

And our four ministry priorities through to 2022 are:

- 1. Growth in Discipleship
- 2. Leadership Development
- 3. Flourishing Churches
- 4. Innovation and Advocacy

It was great to be able to introduce Vision 2022 including the ministry priorities at the clergy conference this year, and then at the six lay leaders meetings where nearly 200 lay leaders gathered.

A key question as we consider this vision statement and ministry priorities is - why? We can have the most wondrous vision statement in the world but still lack the motivation to actually do anything about it. Perhaps that's why so many well-crafted strategic plans sit on a shelf and don't lead to any change. 'Why', then becomes pretty important. Why do we think that it's a good idea to be a diocese of flourishing Anglican communities, united and connected, whose members are competent and confident to live as disciples of Jesus Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit?

For me the answer to 'why' lies in the concept of the kingdom of God. The kingdom of God is a way to describe a reality where all creation is the way it was created by God to be. Where God is recognised, worshipped and revered as God, and where people know a peaceful connection with God through Jesus Christ. A world where humans exercise their vocation of reflecting the praise of creation to God, and the love of God to

all of creation, and so where people experience community and belonging. Where the blessings are shared so all have enough. Where the wider creation is cared for as a ministry of stewardship. We see this future embodied in the life of Jesus Christ. According to Mark 1.15-in Jesus the kingdom of God has come close.

God will bring this future into being, but its foretaste can be experienced now though not fully. It's as if we are looking 'through a glass dimly', but we can get some idea, and we can help this be the case for others, so others might get hold of what God is doing and join in.

The more our Anglican communities are flourishing in the power of the Holy Spirit, the more we are united and connected in the power of the Holy Spirit, the more we live as competent and confident disciples of Jesus in the power of the Holy Spirit, the more our Anglican communities will become places where the vision of God is not just proclaimed in words but experienced, and those Anglican communities will spread the reflection of God to people who haven't seen it yet, and those Anglican communities will help shape the wider community so the kingdom of God is experienced now more and more.

In Jesus the kingdom of God has come close, and I want to see the kingdom more and reflected in our community. This is clearly the hope and will of God, so I want to participate out of reverence, loyalty and obedience to God. That's my 'why'.

I am encouraged by 1 Corinthians 15.58 where Paul says 'Therefore my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labour is not in vain'.

We may or may not see results of our participation in the mission of God pointing to the kingdom of God, but 'in the Lord our labour is not in vain'.

There is a great deal to be done in terms of enacting Vision 2022. We are part way through a one-year implementation plan put together fairly quickly after Vision 2022 was adopted in April this year. A three-year implementation plan is being developed and will be finalised in time for the 2019-2020 budget. There will be opportunity this afternoon in a session led by Amanda Harfield for members of Synod to have input into that plan. We are also in the process of considering the ministry units to make sure our structures serve the priorities we have identified.

We anticipate the three- year plan will be finalised by May next year, but I can today announce a part of it.

You will know of the growth and development and need of the Northern part of the Diocese. Population is growing and is forecast to grow significantly in coming decades. In terms of area, the City of Playford is very large, and the Anglican church is not well represented there, and so Playford and the emerging developments to the north and north west of Playford need to become an area of priority for us. In the process of addressing that strategic priority leadership will be critical. To begin to address this need Bishop Tim Harris will become Bishop Missioner to Playford and Parish Priest of the Parish of Elizabeth. Tim will continue as an Assistant Bishop in the Diocese, but his episcopal ministry will be focussed on Playford. Bishop Tim will take up this new full- time role in December this year, and he and Fiona and John will move to the Playford area in due course. Bishop Tim feels strongly called to this new ministry and I am grateful to God for the vision Bishop Tim

has been given for ministry in the North, and I am grateful to Tim and Fiona that they have the faith and courage to take it up. Bishop Tim's appointment as Parish Priest will be funded by the parish with support from Anglicare. I anticipate there will be no material contribution from the Synod for the appointment. I am grateful for the continuing support of AnglicareSA for the parish of Elizabeth and ministry generally in the Northern part of the Diocese.

There is already good collaboration in Playford between AnglicareSA, St Columba College, Elizabeth Parish and Elizabeth Downs Parish. Over the next few years we will look to expand the ministry team so that we can develop more churches, congregations and fellowships in the city of Playford and further North and North West.

In my view the work of caring for clergy and encouraging lay leaders in parishes as well as those ministering in schools and chaplaincies in the Diocese needs two full time bishops focused on it. Bishop Chris is an important part of the team, but his primary episcopal role is as National Aboriginal Bishop. It is my hope to be able to appoint a full time Assistant Bishop next year to continue Bishop Tim's current Assistant Bishop role and replace him in that.

Another important part of implementing Vision 2022 is St Barnabas College. If you have a look at the four ministry priorities identified as part of the vision St Barnabas will be critical in the implementation of them. In my address to the College commencement service in February this year I outlined my vision for the next phase of the life of the College. The bottom line is St Barnabas needs to serve Vision 2022. The College needs to be able to train and prepare people for ordained ministry across the breadth of the

Diocese. The College needs to be a part of the continuing post ordination education program for the Diocese. The College needs to identify, develop and run training courses and programs for lay ministry and discipleship training. The College Council is in the process of identifying the steps that need to be taken to be the College for ministry for Vision 2022. I am grateful to The Reverend Dr Don Owers who has agreed to serve as the College principal through until the end of 2019. Don's steady leadership will enable the College to be ready to move to its next stage of ministry.

Members of Synod might be aware that the process of recruiting a Ministry Development Officer to work with parishes to assist them in their flourishing is underway. I believe the MDO needs to be a part of the College team so that parish needs are clearly seen by the College, and so that there can be a real dialogue between the theoretical and the practical aspects of training for ministry.

It is plain that if we are going to make any great difference and actually see Anglican communities flourishing more we will need more resources. That will involve offering the people of the Diocese opportunities to use their gifts for ministry. It will involve operating efficiently. It will involve calling for generosity. We will need to look at the physical assets that are part of the Diocese to see how we can make best use of them, including releasing the value of some. As part of that process I think we should look seriously at selling Bishop's Court lock stock and barrel. I know that this has been an almost endless discussion beginning in the early 1900's but I think the time has come to make some hard decisions and I anticipate a proposal coming to Synod next year. In the face of the

urgent need for us to move to growth we need to release resources so as to reduce the pressure of assessments on parishes, and increase the ministry we are able to fund. It is not appropriate in my view for the value of Bishop's Court to remain locked up while the ministry needs of the Diocese are so significant. My view is that the property should be sold, a smaller bishops house purchased, and the remainder of the sale proceeds invested in the See trust. The proceeds of that investment could offset the costs of the bishops' ministry, relieving pressure on the Synod budget and allowing for resources to be deployed for ministry which allows us to move towards implementing Vision 2022.

#### Flourishing Anglican Communities

It is very easy for documents like vision statements to sit on a shelf and not actually affect anything much. That's certainly not what I want for Vision 2022. So as part of considering the vision and living it out we will over the next three years take a part of the vision as our theme for Synod. The theme this year is flourishing Anglican communities. Our vision says that our vision and our yearning is to be a diocese of flourishing Anglican communities in the power of the Holy Spirit.

This includes existing parishes but will include Anglican congregations and communities which haven't been established yet, and I hope will include in time Anglican schools and where appropriate Anglicare. The word flourish means to grow or develop successfully, and has the feel and sound of health and vitality. We want our Anglican communities to be healthy and growing, effective and vital. The vision statement makes it clear that developing and being flourishing Anglican communities will only happen by the power of the Holy Spirit. There

are no levers we can pull which will automatically see our Anglican communities flourish. That's why prayer is so important. I have been very encouraged by the number of individuals and communities that are regularly praying the prayer for growth we produced last year. It is completely right to pray for growth in the four areas included in that prayer; that more people might come to trust Jesus, that the depth of our discipleship will grow, that we might grow in terms of no strings attached service offered to the wider community, and that we will grow in generosity with all that God has given to us look after. Prayer is not an automatic lever either but connects us with the will of God and so apart from anything else changes us and aligns us with the life of God.

Please continue to pray for growth that we might be flourishing communities in the power of the Holy Spirit.

While there are no automatic levers, experience and research has given us some pointers to elements which might be helpful in order to flourish. So, for instance, the Natural Church Development research carried out now over many years right across the globe points to the following elements being important for a healthy church:

- Holistic small groups
- Loving relationships
- Empowering leadership
- Effective structures
- Gift based ministry
- Need oriented evangelism
- Inspiring worship service

• Passionate spirituality.

In 2014 the report from the Church of England called From Anecdote to Evidence was published. Following on from that report is a resource called From Evidence to Action. The English research says that a growing church is likely to:

- 1. Have a clear mission and purpose where clergy and congregations are intentional about growth
- 2. Understand its context, actively engage with it and with those who might not currently go to church
- 3. Have clergy and lay leaders who innovate, envision and motivate people
- 4. Be willing to self-reflect, change and adapt according to its context
- 5. Nurture disciples
- 6. Be welcoming and build on loving relationships with people
- 7. Actively engage children and young people
- 8. Have lay people as well as ordained clergy active in leadership and other roles.

Mark Connor in his book 'Transforming Your Church' suggests the following are important:

- 1. Fervent prayer
- 2. Passionate outreach
- 3. Loving relationships
- 4. Empowering leaders
- 5. Mobilised believers
- 6. United communities
- 7. Generational baton passing.

You will notice there are some common elements and concepts in those lists. They are worth reflecting on and acting on as we seek to help our Anglican communities to flourish.

If we are going to increase our flourishing planning will be necessary. I suggested last year in my address to Synod that it would be helpful for each community to develop a mission action plan, and I am really pleased to know that a number have already done that and more are in the process.

We have sold more than sixty of these really helpful books. The title says it all really-How to do Mission Action Planning. These are on sale from places like www.bookdepository.com, and there are also some copies for sale at Synod. It's not having a mission action plan that counts - you know the piece of paper, no matter how attractive it is. What counts is the quality of the planning process and the quality of the implementation. Mission action plans should not be complicated. Most of our communities are already busy and piles of unachievable aspirational goals just leads to failure. The keys to a successful plan are: pray, do a plan, keep it simple, have a go and keep reviewing.

Research in the UK by Bob Jackson and published in- What Makes Churches Grow (2015) indicates that churches with a Mission Action Plan are more likely to be growing. So, for instance Jackson says of London diocese that 'Mission Action Planning was an integral part of the culture shift that reversed the trend of decline and continues to be up to the present' (78).

I encourage Anglican communities which have not started the process of mission action planning to consider doing so. If you have completed a mission action plan make sure the plan is reviewed each year to keep the ball rolling.

#### Conclusion

I have found past twelve months a very encouraging and positive time in the Diocese. Many people contribute in so many different ways to our ministry life and I want to say thank you. Lay people take up leadership and ministry responsibilities in parishes, on diocesan committees and here at Synod. Clergy serve faithfully and well in parishes, in chaplaincies and in schools. It has been great to work with the Area Deans and Archdeacons as they have carried out their extra tasks. I want to thank especially Gwilym Henry-Edwards for his service as Archdeacon of The City of Adelaide and The Port as he retires from that role. Gwilym has served in this way since November 2015. Happily, he will continue to minister at Port Adelaide. Thank you to all who serve to make the Diocese effective in its ministry of serving the mission of God.

A little while ago I was reading Bishop Short's pastoral address from the 1856 Synod, the second Synod held in Adelaide, and he was reflecting on the purpose of Synod, which is significant because in many ways he invented the modern form of the Anglican synod, and he said this - remember that the members of Synod in 1856 were all men:

'It would be to take a low and false view of the true end of synod meetings, if the mere transaction of ecclesiastical business, the raising of funds, or the maintenance of discipline, were considered to be their highest and holiest purpose. It is not so. The mutual encouragement thus afforded, both to the clergy and laity, the sense of individual responsibility brought home by prominence of position in the church, the feeling of brotherhood in the gospel of Christ,

the interchange of sentiment between clergy and laity and the better acquaintance with the ministry by the people, plainly indicate the real objects of such occasional meetings; besides the diffusion of valuable information, the furtherance of general Church measures and the removal of erroneous impressions. They cultivate in short, the Church feeling of brotherly union and co-operation, as opposed to isolated, selfish, individual religion'.

Bishop Short's vision for Synod was immensely positive. May our time together this weekend reflect that vision and contribute to the building up of the kingdom of God. To quote St Paul once again: 'Therefore my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labour is not in vain' (1 Cor 15.58). Amen.

# MINUTES OF SECOND SESSION OF THE FORTY THIRD TRIENNIAL SYNOD (164TH ANNUAL SESSION)

### Friday 19 - Sunday 21 October 2018

The 164th Session opened with the Synod worship in St Augustine's in the Parish of Unley at 7:00pm on Friday 19 October 2018. The Preacher was The Right Rev'd Dr Tim Harris, Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Adelaide.

On Saturday, 20th October 2018, following Morning Prayer led by The Rev'd Stuart Langshaw in Memorial Hall, St Peter's College, the Archbishop, The Most Rev'd Geoffrey Smith, opened the Third Session of the Forty-Third Triennial Synod by delivering an Address to the Diocese that highlighted the Vision 2022, Flourishing Anglican Communities, the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse and Marriage Equality.

Following the Archbishop's Address, which was circulated to the members, the Synod convened for the dispatch of business.

The President, 102 members of the clergy and 152 lay representatives were present.

1. The President welcomed members, in particular Mr Philip Adams (the new Chancellor) and Mrs Amanda Harfield, the recently appointed Secretary of Synod, to the Third Annual Session of the Forty-Third Triennial Synod. The Archbishop thanked The Rev'd Stuart Langshaw, Archdeacon Mee Ping Lau, Archdeacon Andrew Mintern and The Rev'd Mark Petersen for the co-ordination of worship on Friday night and the Synod worship services. The President made introductory remarks regarding general procedure for Synod.

information been provided to Diocesan Council? If not why not? Can this information also be provided to the Members of Synod through its inclusion in synod papers or handed out at synod? If not why not?

**RESPONSE** – already circulated but read by The Most Rev'd Geoffrey Smith.

The information has been provided to Diocesan Council. Diocesan Council has authorised distribution of the 2017 Summary to Synod. A copy of the Summary is attached to the minutes of Synod.

### **QUESTION 2: Assessment**

Submitted by The Rev'd Stephen Bloor

### Parish Priest in the Parishes of Salisbury and Parafield Gardens

Is the Secretary of Synod aware of any parishes that are not declaring their full assessable income or encouraging their congregations to give money in ways that avoid paying assessment? If so, what action is been taken to address this issue?"

RESPONSE – already circulated but read by The Most Rev'd Geoffrey Smith. The Secretary of Synod is not aware of any parishes that are not declaring their full assessable income.

The Secretary is aware of practices in the Diocese from time to time to encourage congregations to give in ways that will not be subject to assessment.

With the support and oversight of Diocesan Council, discussions and negotiations occur with the parishes concerned.

#### **QUESTION 3: Assessment**

The Rev'd Stephen Bloor asked a further question at Synod, namely:

In light of the definition of "Assessable income" outlined in the Assessments Ordinance 1985 (pg 24) and given the number of clergy and staff that some parishes have, would the Secretary of Synod reconsider her answer to the question?

**RESPONSE** – The Secretary of Synod indicated that she would not reconsider her answer.

# **QUESTION 4:**

The Rev'd Stephen Bloor read the following question at Synod:

Can the Archbishop lawfully authorise a Form of Blessing within the Diocese of Adelaide alongside, or in addition to, a wedding conducted by a civil celebrant given Part 1 of the

Constitution of Anglican Church of Australia that enshrine the Book of Common Prayer, the thirty-nine Articles and the Ordinal as our standard of theology and worship?"

The Archbishop provided a response at Item 10 on Sunday 21 October 2018: Section 4 of the Constitution of the Anglican Church of Australia says that:

This church being derived from the Church of England, retains and approves the doctrine and principles of the of the Church of England embodied in the Book of Common Prayer together with the Form and Manner of Making, Ordaining and Consecrating of Bishops, Priests and Deacons and in the Articles of Religion sometimes called the Thirty-nine articles, but has plenary authority at its own discretion to make statements as to the faith ritual ceremonial or discipline of this Church and to order its forms of worship and rules of discipline and to alter or revise such statements, forms and rules, provided that all such statements, forms rules or alteration or revision thereof are consistent with the Fundamental Declarations contained herein and are made as prescribed by this Constitution. Provided and it is hereby further declared, that the above-named Book of Common Prayer, together with the Thirty-nine articles, be regarded as the authorised standard of worship and doctrine in this Church, and no alteration in or permitted variations from the services or Articles therein contained shall contravene any principal of doctrine or wor-

ship laid down in such standard.

The Anglican church of Australia has the power to alter its authorised forms of service so long as those alterations are consistent with the Fundamental Declarations and do not contravene any principal of doctrine or worship laid down in the Book of Common Prayer or the Thirty- nine articles.

Section 4 of the Constitution provides that a bishop of a Diocese may, at his [or her] discretion, permit deviations from the existing order of service, not contravening any principle of doctrine and worship (of the Book of Common Prayer and the Thirty-nine articles), as shall be submitted to him [or her] by the incumbent and churchwardens of a parish. The Australian Prayer Book Canon 1977 and the Prayer Book for Australia Canon 1995 allow deviations from these authorised services to be authorised in the manner set out in section 4 of the Constitution of the Anglican Church of Australia.

Note that this permission is in response to a request from the incumbent and churchwardens of a parish where the incumbent and churchwardens have followed the process set out in section 4 of the Constitution, and this permission concerns a deviation from the authorised service, not an entirely new service. Furthermore, the deviation must not contravene any principle of doctrine and worship of the Book of Common Prayer and the Thirty-nine articles.

Section 4(c) of the Canon Concerning Services 1992 provides that a service may be authorised for use in a Diocese which has been approved for use, on the recommendation of the Liturgy Commission with the concurrence of the Doctrine Commission, by a decision of at least two-thirds of the Diocesan bishops including all the Metropolitans and approved for use within the diocese by the Diocesan Council of that Diocese.

The Book of Common Prayer and the other prayer books authorised by the Anglican Church of Australia (A Prayer Book for Australia and An Australian Prayer Book) contain Pastoral Services for the 'Solemnization of Matrimony' (also named as 'A Service of Marriage'). In accordance with section 5 of the Canon Concerning Services 1992, they could be readily adapted for use in blessing a marriage conducted by a civil celebrant (especially the 'Prayers of the People'). The adaptation would need to be such that it did not contravene any principle of doctrine and worship of the Book of Common Prayer and the Thirty-nine articles.

In summary, a Diocesan bishop cannot authorise services. Services are authorised by the General Synod, or according to section 4c of the Canon Concerning Services 1992.

A Bishop may permit a deviation from an authorised service according to the process set out in Section 4 of the Constitution of the Anglican Church of Australia.

The following Petition was tabled at Synod by The Rev'd Stephen Clark:

Petition of Adelaide Clergy & Lay Synod Representatives to the Diocese of Adelaide:

We the undersigned request that the Diocesan Leadership Team, in consultation with the clergy and laity of the Diocese, investigate the possibility and desirability of a process leading to Diocesan provision for the blessing of same sex marriage at civil ceremonies or following a civil ceremony.

#### 21.1 MOTION FROM SUPPLEMENTARY NOTICE PAPER

This Synod notes:

That on 7 September 2017 the General Synod of the Anglican Church of Australia passed two motions on same-sex marriage

#### "The General Synod -

- a) notes with regret that the Scottish Episcopal Church has amended their Canon on Marriage to change the definition that marriage is between a man and a woman by adding a new section that allows clergy to solemnise marriage between same-sex couples as well as couples of the opposite sex;
- b) notes with regret that this step is contrary to the doctrine of our Church and the teaching of Christ that, in marriage, "a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh" (Matt 19:6), and
- c) expresses our support for those Anglicans who have left or will need to leave the Scottish Episcopal Church because of its redefinition of marriage and those who struggle and remain; and
- d) prays that the Scottish Episcopal Church will return to the doctrine of Christ in this matter and that impaired relationships will be restored."

And

"The General Synod –

- (i) recognises that the doctrine of our church, in line with traditional Christian teaching, is that marriage is an exclusive and lifelong union of a man and a woman, and further,
- (ii) recognises that this has been the subject of several General Synod resolutions over the past fifteen years, and also
- (iii) recognises that the nature of marriage is the subject of ongoing conversation within the church and wider community and that we need to listen to each other with care and respect, and
- (iv) acknowledges the experiences and genuine concerns of LGBTIQ+ people within the church and the community, and therefore

- v) asks the Doctrine Commission to facilitate a respectful conversation in our church by means of a collection of essays on marriage and same-sex relationships that explores Scriptural and theological issues relating to:
- a. The doctrine of marriage expressed in the formularies of the Anglican Church of Australia
  - b. Our current Australian context, exploring the relationship between the State's
  - definition of marriage and the church's doctrine of marriage
  - c.Key Old Testament and New Testament texts on sex, marriage and friendship
  - d. Scripture and hermeneutics
  - e. A theology of blessing
  - f. A theology of desire
  - g. Godly disagreement on this issue
  - h. The case for and against same-sex marriage and/or the blessing of same-sex unions."
- 2. That the doctrine of the Anglican Church of Australia is that the definition of marriage is between a man and a woman and only between a man and a woman.
- 3. That any Diocese that seeks to endorse the blessing of marriages between same-sex couples will be acting contrary to the recently confirmed doctrine of the Anglican Church of Australia as expressed in the Bishops' Resolution of March 2018 (see Bishops' Resolution in the Explanatory Memorandum).
- 4. That the Archbishop of Adelaide wrote in his Pastoral Letter to Clergy (part 2) in December 2017:

"All of us who are licensed (or hold a PTO) have assented to the doctrine of the Book of Common Prayer and have undertaken to use only authorised liturgy in public worship. The Book of Common Prayer and our other authorised marriage liturgies do not allow for marriage between a same sex couple therefore we are unable to bless the civil marriage of a same sex couple in any way that looks like a wedding service or purports to bless the marriage."

5. That a Diocesan Bishop who endorses a blessing that is contrary to the doctrine of the Anglican Church of Australia may be placing the Bishop at risk of having a charge brought against them under the Special Tribunal.

#### Meetings

The RAP Working Group met on two occasions in the past year in May and July 2019. At the May meeting, we heard a detailed report by Bishop Chris McLeod on ministry developments at the Point Pearce Aboriginal Commu-

nity, which are progressing well with the participation of 70 – 80 members of the community of 150 in the monthly worship and fellowship gatherings supported by emerging local leaders and ecumenical visitors from Anglican and Baptist Churches. Bishop Chris also informed us of various ways in which he engages with others in the support of Aboriginal Christian leaders in South Australia and beyond.

The RAP Working Group is developing a stronger connection with the 'Anglicans Towards Reconciliation' network which is a growing network meeting five times annually and currently associated with CISMU. Several members of this network are also involved in the RAP Working Group.

While the network is a broader movement of Anglicans with an interest in developing awareness, providing learning resources and opportunities for engagement in Aboriginal led commemorations, celebrations and events, the RAP Working Group has a specific task to develop a 'Reflect RAP' focusing on Relationships, Respect and Opportunity.

The RAP development process seeks to build on the commitment of the Diocese through Vision 2022 by drawing together as much feedback from members of the Diocese as possible. This will enable us to participate fully in the RAP development, review and endorsement process through Reconciliation Australia. We have maintained contact with Reconciliation Australia, though we have not yet submitted a Draft RAP which is currently an internal document currently in its third draft stage.

During the year a small 'RAP Writers Group' was developed to focus on the writing of the RAP. Members include Jim Raw, Brad Chapman and Peter Burke.

#### Synod

Synod members may recall last year's presentation from representatives of Anglican Schools. The twelve Anglican Schools have developed or are developing RAPs and this is a great source of encouragement as to what can be achieved when people and communities are engaged.

In order to progress towards our first Draft to Reconciliation Australia, the RAP Working Group has developed a one hour workshop for the forthcoming Synod in October 2019. The workshop will present an update, focus on the areas of RAP development presented in the last Synod report in 2018, and seek feedback from members of Synod on areas of interest and ideas for action in the following areas:

- Standing in Solidarity
- Respectful Listening
- Walking Together
- Networking Freely
- Nurturing Leadership
- Connecting Spiritually
- Inviting Advocacy

Synod Members are invited to prepare for this workshop by reflecting on what these simple phrases suggest to us as a Diocesan community, as to how we may effectively engage with each other and with Aboriginal people and communities in our shared journey of reconciliation.
